Held at the Institution, on the 17th January, 1856,

THE Report of the Committee of Management for 1855, having been read by the Secretary, the following Resolutions were passed:—

Moved by J. S. Hill, Esq. Seconded by Rev. I. Harding.

1. That the Report now read be adopted, and printed under the direction of the Committee of Management, together with a List of the Office Bearers of the Institution for 1856; Abstract of Accounts; List of Subscriptions; List of Diseases treated during 1855; and the Rules of the Institution.

2. That the cordial thanks of the Subscribers be given to the Committee of the Geelong and Western Ladies' Benevolent Association, for their liberal offer to hand over £1,400, the proceeds of the late Bazaar, in aid of the Funds of the Hospital, and that one of the new wards be furnished out of such amount.

## FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

## COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

OF THE

# Geelong Infirmary and Benebolent Asylum,

JANUARY, 1856.

On the occasion of presenting their last Report, your Committee had reason to apprehend, that from lack of funds the doors of your Institution would have to be closed against the further admission of patients and inmates; your Committee, therefore, feel that they have twofold cause for gratitude to the Almighty disposer of events, for that not only has such a catastrophe as was apprehended been averted, but the Institution has continued its operations with unimpaired usefulness, as shewn by the number of persons who have received its aid during the past year.

As shown in the last Report, 72 persons remained in the institution on 1st January, 1855; 49 in the Infirmary, and 23 in the Benevolent Asylum. During the past year, 350 persons have been admitted: 323 to the Infirmary, and 27 to the Benevolent Asylum, making 422 persons who have been treated in the house during the year. Of this number, 280 were discharged cured, or considerably relieved, from the Infirmary; 51 died; and 41 remained in the Infirmary on 1st January, 1856. 16 left the Benevolent Asylum of their own accord, 7 died, and 27 remained in the Benevolent Asylum on the 1st January, 1856; or altogether, 68 in the institution. 169 out-patients have received medical advice and medicine during the year.

Your Committee, as in previous years, in reference to the number of deaths that has occurred, think it right to remark that the mortality must necessarily bear a large proportion to the number of admissions, in consequence of known incurable cases admitted, to linger a few months. And of persons absolutely dying being admitted. For instance, some have died a few hours after admission. And in two cases, not accidents, the patients died within five minutes after admission.

Your Committee is happy to report, that the benefits of your Institution continue to be extended to persons of every sect of religion, thus proving the universality of its operations.

The system of admitting patients by printed tickets, issued to subscribers, has been found to work very well; and with the exception of increasing the number of tickets given to ten guinea subscribers, your Committee do not propose any alteration in the system.

Your Committee are gratified at being enabled to report the improvement to the building, which has been effected by the completion, in accordance with the original design of the two wings, which have at once increased the architectural attractions of the building, and greatly enlarged its accommodation. To complete the original design, a portico is now only required; and by having returned to the building fund. a sum of £1500, which, in the beginning of the year, was borrowed for maintenance. Arrangements have been made for completing this work, as well as repairs to the building, and thorough drainage of the premises: a matter of most serious import, involving much expense. There being now ample accommodation, your Committee trust that the income of the Institution, derived from the subscriptions of the public, will be so liberal as to make it available to those who may require its aid.

With a view to the production of the vegetables required for the use of the Institution, a large portion of the five acre allotment, on which the building stands, was trenched, and planted with potatoes; and although the first crop does not promise to be very abundant, there is every reason to hope that hereafter the cultivation of the ground will be a great saving of expenditure. But the cultivation of the ground is also a point of much importance, as greatly increasing the comfort and healthy enjoyment of convalescent patients and inmates, and your Committee would remark, that presents of trees, or seeds for the formation of a belt of trees, around the ground, would be very acceptable.

The accounts of receipt and expenditure, have been audited by Messss. McKellar and Ibbotson, and an abstract will be read to you. As is usual, a detailed statement of every item of expenditure has been prepared for your inspection. It will be seen, that the receipts have been £10,270 10s. 5d., and the expenditure, £8,366 9s. 11d., so that, making provision for the various works already alluded to, a balance of £404 0s. 6d. remains in favour of the Institution. The cause which has mainly contributed to recruit the finances of the Institution, was the receipt of a considerable sum of money, assigned by Government to the Institution, after solicitations by deputations and correspondence, from a fund which had accumulated during a series of vears, from the unclaimed proceeds of the sale of impounded cattle. And your Committee consider that thanks are due to the Government, also to the Legislative Council, who voted £1500 for the Institution, for the liberal assistance rendered. The mere annual amount of the fund alluded to, cannot, however, be great, and your Committee do not expect that such source of income can be depended on; and as the expenses of the Institution for maintenance alone, are necessarily great, being nearly £106 per week, or £440 a-month, each patient costing, on an average, £13 1s. 6d., which will absorb the balance in hand in about the space of one month; it must depend on the continued liberal support of the public to be continued in its present state of usefulness.

Your Committee take this opportunity of thanking publicly, all who have rendered effective aid to the Institution, by large contributions raised by dramatic performances, concerts, &c.

The thanks of the subscribers are also due to the Honorary Medical Officers, who have acted during the past year.

Your Committee, before closing their Report, cannot but express their extreme regret, that the late Resident Surgeon, Mr. Rock, found it necessary, from ill-health, to resign the appointment. Mr. Rock had always given the most perfect satisfaction in his management of the Institution, and he deserves the warmest thanks the Committee can express. Doctor W. P. Geoghegan, a gentleman, having had long and extensive experience in the management of similar institutions, has been elected in Mr. Rock's stead.

In conclusion, your Committee express a hope, that their management during the past year has met with your approval, and now resign the management of the Institution into your hands.

## GENERAL RULES

AND

## INTERNAL REGULATIONS

OF

THE INSTITUTION.

## GENERAL RULES.

I. That the objects of the Infirmary be to afford Medical and Surgical aid to poor persons requiring it, for a limited number of paying patients, and for casualties; but that no person who shall meet with casualties, and shall be found able to pay for surgical aid, shall receive further than temporary gratuitous assistance. the object of the Benevolent Asylum be the reception of the Poor and Distressed, with a view to afford them consolation and assistance.

ORTROPS:

II. That a portion of the building be set apart for the purposes Appropriation of the Building. of the Infirmery; and the remainder for the purposes of the Benevolent Asylum, at the discretion of the Committee.

III. That the Institution shall consist of a President, two Vice-Institution, how constituted. Presidents, five Trustees, a Treasurer, four Honorary Medical Officers, a Secretary, Governors, and Subscribers, as hereinafter described.

QUALIFICATIONS AND PRIVILEGES OF GOVERNORS AND Subscribers.

IV. That every Benefactor of £50 or upwards, be a Life-Governor, and every annual Contributor of £20 an annual Governor, with liberty of having one in-patient or three out-patients always on the books of the Institution, subject to the approval of the Committee of Management hereinafter mentioned, and provided that the funds of the Institution admit of the reception of such patients.

V. That the Executor, or if more than one, the first named Executors, where Executor, under any will by which a bequest of £50 or upwards shall be made to the Institution; and every Minister raising by Ministers raising one or more collections in his Church, in any one year, the sum of £20 or upwards, shall have the rights and privileges of a Governor for one year only, commencing from the January following.

VI. That every Benefactor of £25 or upwards, in one sum, be a Life-Subscriber, with liberty of having one in-patient and three out-patients admitted annually; and every Contributor of £1 1s. and upwards, annually, an Annual Subscriber, with liberty of having patients admitted as follows: - Annual Subscribers of £10 10s., four in-patients and eight out-patients; of £5 5s., two in-patients and four out-patients; of £3 3s., one in-patient and two out-patients; of £2 2s., four out-patients; of £1 1s., two out-Recommendations for admission to be subject to the approval of the House Committee, and to be made by tickets only. to be issued by the Secretary to Subscribers, at the time of their becoming such, and provided that whenever any recommendation cannot be acceded to, from want of room, or other cause appearing to the Committee, the ticket used in such recommendation shall be reclaimable by the Subscriber issuing the same; and such ticket shall only be used for the recommendation of persons unable to pay for medical attendance; and shall only be available till 31st of January, in the year after that in which they are issued.

Subscriptions, when due. VII. That the annual subscriptions must be paid in advance for the current year, such year to be computed from the first day of January in each year, and no Governor or Subscriber will be entitled to any privilege until the subscription be paid, if demanded.

Annual Meeting of Subscribers, when.

VIII. There shall be an annual meeting of the Subscribers in the month of January of each year, at which all Honorary Officers of the Institution shall be elected for the ensuing year.

Persons not qua lified to vote. IX. That no person shall vote at any meeting while he is a salaried officer, or pupil of the Institution; nor any new Subscriber, unless his subscription shall have been paid for three months preceding.

General Laws.

X. That no new general law, nor any repeal of, or alteration in, the existing laws shall be valid, unless the same shall have been passed at an annual or special meeting of the Subscribers; and at least eight days notice of such alteration having been given.

XI. The Committee of Management shall consist of the Presi- Committee of Madent, Vice-President, Treasurer, Honorary Medical Officers, and eighteen Subscribers, to be elected annually; six to form a quorum; and they shall have power to fill up vacancies that may occur in their number during the year, subject to Rule XIV.

XII. It shall be competent at any time for the Committee of Special Meetings of Subscribers. Management, at which at least eight members shall be present, or for nine or more Subscribers, by a writing under their hands, to require the Secretary to summon, at the expiration of fourteen days, a special meeting of subscribers, the occasion of calling such ' meeting being stated in the requisition; and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting, except that for which it shall have been summoned. Every such meeting to be called by the Secretary, by advertisement in one of the public newspapers, published in Geelong, within three days of his receiving such requisition. Twelve Subscribers shall be necessary to form a general or special meeting.

XIII. That all meetings of Subscribers be called by the Secre- Meetings of Subscribers called tary, by advertisement, in one of the newspapers published in by Advertise-Geelong, at least one week before the day of meeting.

XIV. In the event of any vacancies in the offices of President, Honorary Officers mode of Elec-Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Trustees, and Auditors, the election of a successor shall take place at a special meeting of Subscribers, to be convened by the Committee of Management, which election shall be by voting-tickets, as enjoined by Act of Council, 11 Vic.,

XV. And it shall be lawful at all meetings of Subscribers, for Vote by Proxy. any Subscriber duly qualified to vote, to vote either in person or by proxy, such proxy being also a subscriber duly qualified: provided that such proxy shall be in writing, and shall be signed by the Subscriber, and shall only extend to the one meeting especially named therein. Governors to have three votes: Life-Subscribers three votes; Annual Subscribers of £10 10s, three votes; of £5 5s. two votes; of £1 1s., and upwards, one vote.

### COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

Committee of Ma agement; XVI. The Committee of Management shall direct the general business of the Institution; shall frame bye-laws for its internal

- Their duties and regulation, the same not being repugnant to the General Rules; shall have power to enter into all necessary contracts on behalf of the Institution, and direct payment to be made thereof; and appoint and discharge all paid officers and servants of the Institution. They shall meet at the Institution on the first Wednesday in every month, and on such other days as they may appoint. They shall have power to admit patients, and to make regulations respecting them. The Chairman of Committee, in case of an equality of votes, to have a casting vote, but no deliberative vote.
- Members ex-officio XVII. The President, Vice-Presidents, Trustees, Treasurer, and Honorary Medical Officers, shall be members, ex-officio, of the Committee, provided they be qualified by subscription.
- House Committee. XVIII. The Committee of Management shall choose, from among themselves, a House Committee of five, three to form a quorum, who shall meet on Monday and Thursday in each week, at 4 o'clock p.m., and oftener if necessary; and who shall have power to admit patients, to examine and pass the house accounts, to engage and discharge servants, and to regulate the internal management of the Institution.
- Annual Report. XIX. The Committee of Management shall present a general report of the affairs of the Institution at the annual meeting of Subscribers.

## HONORARY MEDICAL OFFICERS.

- Management of XXI. The Resident Surgeon shall have the entire management of the cases, but the Honorary Medical Officer of the month may be requested to attend in all important cases.
- Their attendance XXII. The attendance of the Honorary Medical Officers shall be once a week, for one month in rotation; and at such times as

they may find convenient; but in cases of emergency all may be requested to attend. The arrangements of the rotation of duty to be left to themselves.

XXIII. The Honorary Medical Officers shall have access to the Access to Institu-Institution at all times, irrespective of the rotation of duty.

XXIV. The Honorary Medical Officers shall not interfere with the admission or discharge of patients.

ADMISSION OF PATIENTS INTO THE INFIRMARY.

XXV. That accidents, and such cases of decided emergency only, as in the opinion of the Resident Surgeon cannot be delayed, be received into the Infirmary at any time without ticket, Admission into the but that the admission of patients, in ordinary cases, be restricted to Monday and Thursday in each week, and only if recommended by a Subscriber's ticket.

#### Admission of Paying Patients.

XXVI. That Paying Patients be admitted on the usual days of Patients to be adadmission, without tickets, at the discretion of the Committee.

XXVII. That the amount chargeable to each patient shall be at Amount to be the discretion of the Committee; and that any patient, on being admitted, must pay to the Treasurer the amount chargeable for Deposit. one month in advance, and also give a guarantee from some Guarantee. responsible person to reimburse the Committee any further expense that may be incurred on behalf of such patient.

XXVIII. That the general rules and regulations of the Insti-Rules applicable to Paying Patution shall be applicable to, and strictly observed by, all paying patients received into the Institution.

XXIX. No pregnant female, for the purpose of confinement- Persons not adno person insane-no one having a contagious or infectious disease -no one subject to epilepsy-nor any one who, in the opinion of the Resident Surgeon, might receive equal benefit as an outpatient, shall be admitted; and no child under five years of age shall be admitted, except from an accident, or for a surgical operation.

Admission of Inmates into the Benevolent Asylum. XXX. The admission of inmates into the Benevolent Asylum is ordinarily restricted to Monday and Thursday in each week, Admission of In-

XXXI. No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement-no Persons not admissible. person insane—no child under twelve years of age—no one having a contagious or infectious disease shall be admitted.

XXXII. Ministers of Religion shall have free access to persons Ministers of Religion. of their respective denominations, at such times as shall be appointed by the Committee of Management; and when a patient requests that any minister may be sent for, his wish shall be immediately complied with.

Religious Instruc-XXXIII. That Instruction of the patients in the Institution be left to the recognized religious teachers of the various denominations to which the patients belong: and it shall be understood that controversial works be prohibited.

#### SECRETARY AND COLLECTOR.

XXXIV. He shall personally attend all Special, General and Secretary, &c. Committee Meetings; he shall take minutes of the proceedings, His duties. and transcribe them carefully into books to be kept for that purpose, and he shall carry out the directions of such Meetings in

the particulars incident to his department.

Collect and pay. XXXV. He shall collect subscriptions and all monies due to the Institution, and pay over the same to the Treasurer once in every week, together with an accurate account of the amount by him received since the last payment.

XXXVI. He shall conduct the correspondence and other and Accounts. clerical business of his department, and he shall enter and keep the accounts of the Institution under the directions of the Committees.

1. The Resident Surgeon shall live in the house, and shall not Regulations leave it except on necessary occasions. He shall not be absent for more than three hours at one time, nor after 12 o'clock at night, without the sanction of the House Committee. In case of absence, he shall inform the Matron, and enter in a book kept for the purpose, where he may be found.

He shall preserve order and sobriety, and in case of insubordination or gross default of duty on the part of any servant, he shall suspend or discharge such servant until the next meeting of the House Committee, and, if necessary, he shall provisionally hire a substitute for such servant so suspended or discharged, and he shall report his having done so, with the cause

of such suspension or discharge, to the House Committee, at their next meeting; but he shall in no case absolutely discharge, or permanently hire any servant of the Institution, without the sanction of the House Committee.

Medicines, medisuing quarter.

4. He shall have the charge of and be accountable for the calinstruments, medicines, medical instruments, utensils, and stores, except such furniture, &c.; medicines, medical instruments, utensils, and stores, except such charge of them, as are in the charge of the Matron, and he shall make an Inveninventory of them, lists of tory of them in a book to be kept for that purpose, in which he shall regularly enter the receipt, loss, or breakage of each article: and he shall, on the last day of the months of February, May, August, and November, of each year, prepare and submit to the House Committee a list of medicines, medical instruments. utensils, and stores, required during the ensuing quarter: and he shall receive all money and other property belonging to the patients, and account for it to the House Committee.

Patients' money.

Books to be kept.

5. He shall enter regularly, in proper books to be kept for such purposes, the names of the patients as they are admitted and discharged, and note the nature and history of their diseases while under treatment; the receipt, issue, expenditure, loss, or breakage of medicines, medical instruments, and other things in his charge, and the disbursement of petty cash; and he shall Attend the weekly have such books ready at all times for the inspection of the meetings of the House Committee, and he shall attend the weekly meetings of the House Committee.

Visit each patient; complaints

tee.

G. He shall visit each patient every morning and evening, and shall inquire if the treatment prescribed has been attended to, and if any cause of complaint exist. Should any patient have a complaint to prefer, he shall enter it immediately in the Patients' Complaint Book, in the presence of the wardsman or nurse of the ward, and he shall lay such book before the House Committee at each meeting.

Condition of the wards, &c.

7. He shall, on his visits to the wards, examine their condition with respect to cleanliness, temperature, and ventilation; and he shall observe if the wardsmen and nurses have done their duty.

Bed-tickets.

8. He shall cause to be affixed to the bed of each patient, the patient's name, age, religion, disease, the date of admission, and the name of the subscriber by whom recommended.

9. He shall write upon every medicine dispensed by him, the Medicines, partiname of the patient for whom it is prescribed, and the time at and the manner in which it is to be administered, and this, however frequently the same medicine may be repeated; and he shall cause the medicines to be administered as directed; and he shall keep a proper supply of the necessary apparatus for cases of Supply for acciaccident or emergency, ready for immediate use.

- 10. He shall inspect the diet of the patients, and see that it is Inspect diet, &c. of good quality, and properly prepared, and such as is ordered; and that the patients do not partake of any food, liquor, or medicine, except that prescribed.
- 11. He shall procure such articles as may be required in his Articles purchased during the week department, in small quantities, during the week, but he shall not to exceed not purchase for the Institution exceeding Ten Pounds, nor enter £10. into any contract on account of the Institution, exceeding that sum in amount, without an order from the House Committee.

#### MATRON.

12. The Matron shall live in the House, and shall not leave it Regulations except on necessary occasions, and with the consent of the Resi-She shall not be absent for more than three hours at one time, nor after ten o'clock at night, without the leave of the House Committee.

13. She shall see that the nurses and servants do their duty; Superintendence and she shall enforce personal cleanliness, neatness, and obedience to orders on their part. She shall have the charge of and be accountable for the furniture, bedding, linen, glass, cutlery, cooking and kitchen ticles required utensils, and she shall make an inventory of the same in a book to be kept for the purpose, in which she shall regularly enter the receipt, loss, or breakage of each article; and she shall, on the last day of the months of February, May, August, and November, in each year, prepare and submit to the House Committee an Inventory of everything under her charge, and a list of articles of the above description, as may be required for the ensuing quarter.

She shall receive the stores and supplies furnished by the Receive stores and supplies; and the contractors and tradesmen, and she shall see that they correspond dispense consumption, in description, quality, and quantity, with the tenders and orders, and daily enter the amount in a and in case they do not, she shall report accordingly to the book. ### WARDSMEN, NURSES, AND SERVANTS.

Attendance of Wardsmen and Nurses. 17. The Wardsmen and Nurses shall be constantly in their wards, and regular in their attendance upon the patients.

20. The Wardsmen and Nurses shall be particular to observe Personal cleanli-

- 21. They shall serve up breakfast to the patients at 8 o'clock Breakfast. in the morning.
- 22. They shall have the several chamber-utensils scalded every Details to morning, and scoured as often as may be necessary, and kept out promote of the wards during the day, unless specially required. comfort
- and 23. They shall pay great attention to the bedding of the patients, and have the mattresses thoroughly aired and dried when cleanliness. necessary, and the sheets, blankets, and counterpanes, renewed as often as it may require.
- 24. They shall not allow clothes to be hung, nor dirt, or any thing to be thrown out of the windows.
- 25. They shall administer to the patients at the times directed, Medicines, the medicines and diet prescribed, and they shall not suffer them to take any which are not prescribed, and they shall be careful to explain to the patients the instructions of the Resident-Surgeon.
- 26. They shall not permit patients to receive from Visitors Regulations specting visitors, medicines, victuals, or liquor of any kind; nor allow any portion of medicine or diet, nor any other thing to be removed from the wards by the patients or visitors, without an order from the Resident-Surgeon.
- 27. They shall be careful to collect and carry to the Resident- Empty phials, &c. Surgeon all empty phials, gallipots, bandages, &c.; and to the Matron any articles of diet not consumed by the patients; and they shall attend at the Dispensary at the time appointed to receive medicines and instructions.

to attend at the Dispensary for medicines.

Watch and report 28. They shall watch attentively the state and symptoms of patients' state the patients, more especially in urgent or uncommon cases, and report these distinctly to the Resident-Surgeon, or in his absence to the Matron.

Admission of strangers.

29. They shall not admit any stranger into any ward without the permission of the Resident-Surgeon or the Matron.

Wardsman or Nurse in rotation shall be on duty from Nurse on night 8 o'clock every night to 6 o'clock the following morning, and shall visit every ward once in every two hours, or more frequently if necessary, and shall pay due attention to such patients as may require it, and, should there be occasion, shall communicate with the Resident-Surgeon.

Wardsmen, Nurses and Servants to be obedient to the Regulations of the Institution, and they shall report immediant to the regulation; report impropriety and infiningement to person; and if such complaint be not properly attended to, they the Resident-Surgeon or Matron any impropriety of person; and if such complaint be not properly attended to, they the Resident-Surgeon or Matron and person; and if such complaint be not properly attended to, they such as the House-Committee at its next meeting to the House-Committee.

### PATIENTS.

Conduct; observe directions.

32. Patients shall conduct themselves orderly, and shall strictly observe all the directions of the Resident-Surgeon, Matron, Wardsmen, and Nurses.

Medicines and diet 33. They shall take their medicines at the time directed, and they shall take no other medicines than those prescribed; and they shall not conceal nor put away any portion of the medicine or diet administered to them.

Details respecting liberty to leave the ward, and go into another the wards, ab- ward or apartment, nor leave the house, nor remain out for a sence, visitors, longer time than is granted, nor shall introduce visitors, nor

receive medicines, victuals, liquors, or any thing, without the express leave of the Resident-Surgeon.

35. They shall not play at cards or dice, nor gamble or smoke, Details respecting nor spit on the floor, nor deface or injure any part of the ward, nor any furniture, bedding, or clothing therein, nor sing, blaspheme, or use rude or indecent language.

cleanliness and conduct.

- 36. No patient shall give reward or gratuity to any of the Notto give reward or gratuity. Wardsmen, Nurses, or other servants.
- 37. Any patient having any cause of complaint shall make Regulations the same known to the Resident-Surgeon, whose duty it shall be to enter such complaint immediately, in the presence of the nurse or wardsman of the ward, in a book kept for that purpose, which book shall be laid before the House-Committee at each meeting.
- 38. Patients judged by the Resident-Surgeon sufficiently con- Employment convalescent valescent to be able to assist in the work of the Institution shall patients. be so employed.
- 39. Patients shall not sit up after 8 o'clock in the winter, or Regulations specting rising and sitting up. 9 o'clock in the summer; and all patients considered by the Resident-Surgeon able to do so, shall rise by 7 o'clock in the summer, and before 8 o'clock in the winter.
- 40. No venereal patients shall be admitted a second time, Venereal Patients having been once under treatment and cured.
- 41. Every patient offending against the above Regulations will Patients offending against the Rebe discharged for irregularity. gulations to be discharged.

### VISITORS.

42. Visitors are admitted into the Institution on Sunday and when admitted, Thursday in each week, between the hours of 3 and 5 o'clock in visits limited to one hour. the afternoon; but no visitor is allowed to remain more than one hour.

Special visits.

- 43. Visitors may be admitted on special occasions by a written order from a member of the House-Committee, addressed to the Resident-Surgeon or Matron.

- 44. Visitors will not be allowed to go into any ward without specting visits. the leave of the Resident-Surgeon; and every visitor must retire when requested.
  - 45. They will not be permitted to give to, or leave with any Patient, any money, medicine, food, or liquor of any kind, nor any other thing, without the express sanction of the Resident-Surgeon.

- 46. No Visitor shall give to any Servant of the Institution any money or gratuity of any kind.
- Not to interfere, &c.: quietness.
  - 47. Visitors are requested not to interfere with the Wardsmen or Nurses, and not to disturb the Patients by loud talking or unnecessary noise.
