Geelong Infirmary & Benevolent Asylum.

Held at the Institution, Wednesday, 26th Jan., 1870.

THE Chairman called upon the Secretary to read the advertisement calling the Meeting; and this having been done, the Eighteenth Annual Report and Financial Statement of the Committee was read.

REV, ASTLEY COOPER moved, and

That the Report and Financial Statement now read be adopted and printed, under the direction of the Committee of Management, together with the usual Statistics, Lists of Subscriptions, Rules, &c. (Carried.)

EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT
 OF THE
 COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT
 OF THE
GEE LONG INFIRMARY

Referring to the operations of the Institution for the past year, the Committee report that the number of persons who have received the aid of the Institution during the year is 3316, viz, 863 in-patients, 129 inmates of the Benevolent Asylum, and 2334 out-patients, with the following results:—

It will be observed that the rate per cent. of deaths, slightly over 7½, is again low, when the nature of the cases is taken into consideration, known incurable cases being admitted.

Amongst the cases treated there were—Rheumatism, 70; Fracture, 49; Wounds, 47; Contusions, 42; Fever, 36; Cancer, 26; Consumption, 39; Bronchitis, 22; Heart Disease, 16; Tumor, 13; Paralysis, 31; Stricture, 14; Hydatid, 7; and so on, as per list of diseases attached.

The Patients professed to belong to the following churches: Church of England, 385; Roman Catholic, 332; Presbyterian, 94; Wesleyan, 91; Lutheran, 21; Congregational, 15; Baptist, 9; and others were 2 Pagans and 43 no religion or unknown.

There were 302 natives of England, 264 of Ireland, 70 of Scotland, 14 of Wales, 114 of Australia, 11 of Tasmania, 4 of Germany, 11 of Switzerland, 2 of East Indies, 2 of Denmark, 2 of Nova Scotia, 5 of United States, 1 of New Zealand, 6 of Prussia, 1 of Holland, 3 of Sweden, 2 of Jamaica, 1 of Malta, 5 of France, 1 of Cape of Good Hope, 1 of Jersey, 1 of Finland, 2 of Italy, 2 of Canada, 1 of Norway, 2 of China, and 1 born at sea.

The total amount of receipts during the year, including £1500 balance of grant from Government for 1868, was L7420 17s. 10d; and the expenditure, including L1574 17s. overdraft at the beginning of the year, L8061 2s. 7d. There is thus a debit of L640 4s. 9d., but to meet this there is L800 due from the Government grant in aid, which was L4800.

There are liabilities on contracts not completed amounting to L200, but the efforts of the Committee to obtain an increased grant from the Government having been successful there will in reality be but a very small debt to bring forward. The Financial Statement is appended.

The Subscription List has been well sustained, showing that the operations of the Institution are viewed with satisfaction by the general public. As, however, the number seeking aid, as will be seen by reference to the statistics, continue to increase, the Committee must appeal again for still greater support, and especially do they do so to those who have not yet enrolled their names as subscribers to the institution.

The Committee note with very great pleasure the amounts received from the Friendly Societies L46, German Musical Society L50, Sons of Temperance L10, St. Mary's Church L40, Wesleyan Church L20, Collections by Swiss Gentlemen L30, Concert at Steiglitz L15, Concert at Morrisons L10, and Lecture by Rev. Peter Menzies L10.

They desire to thank those gentlemen in the country who have taken the trouble to collect and forward subscriptions of considerable amounts, without which the Committee would not have been able to claim the whole of the Government grant. Amongst these are—Mr John McLaughlin, Colac; Mr Duncan McNicol, Camperdown; Messrs John, William, and George Cumming; Messrs George and Thomas Russell, and Thomas Russell and Co.; Messrs Wilson and Buchanan; Messrs W. and N. G. Elder; Messrs J. and P. Manifold; Messrs R. L. and James Bell; Messrs J. L. Currie, A. Chirside, Weston, Davies, A. Armstrong, N. Cole, A. Dennis, W. Adeney, the Koort-Koort-Nong estate, and others.

The Committee have pleasure also in acknowledging the kindness of the proprietors of the *Argus*, the *Age* and *Leader*,

the *Geelong Advertiser*, the *Ballarat Star*, and *Melbourne Punch*, who have furnished gratis copies of their respective papers for the use of the inmates—a kindness which has been very much appreciated ; also of Miss Buchanan, Miss Mack, Miss Hastie, Messrs J. Napier, G. A. Green, H. Franks, G. Mercer, James Strachan, C. A. Mount, Hyslop, Buttle, Whitelaw, and others, for *Illustrated London News*, monthly periodicals, and other useful books ; also Mr John Davison, for a number of engravings for hanging on the walls of the wards. The Committee would earnestly solicit more of such things.

Early in the year the Chief Secretary, Mr McCulloch, made an offer of L850 to the Committee for the purpose of erecting wards for the reception of lunatics on remand from the police court. A sub-committee was, in consequence, appointed to take this matter into consideration, and after patient and full enquiry they reported that, looking at the nature of the accommodation that would be required, and at the future requirements of this Institution for its own legitimate objects, it is not desirable to erect wards for lunatics on the ground at present belonging to the Institution ; but that, as it is most desirable to remove lunatics from the jail, if the Government would grant a portion of land which is now vacant at the rear of the Institution, whereon to erect the required buildings, the Committee could take the management on terms to be arranged with the Government. The Committee of Management unanimously adopted this report, and they have reason to believe the majority of the Trustees agree with it, as they are averse to any portion of the present ground being occupied by wards for lunatics. A deputation then waited on the Chief Secretary and submitted their proposition, but Mr McCulloch distinctly refused to grant any land for the purpose.

Subsequently, on September 2nd, a letter was received from Mr Napier, hon. secretary of a committee appointed at a public meeting of the inhabitants of the town to collect subscriptions for the purpose of erecting a ward, to be called the Alfred Memorial Ward, asking if this Committee intended to do anything in the matter of erecting wards for lunatics, as that Committee had a sum in hand which might be made available. The Committee replied that, having in view the requirements of this Institution and the refusal of the Chief Secretary to grant a piece of land, they had reluctantly declined the offer of L850 from the Government; and thus, so far as this Committee is concerned, the matter ended.

At a late meeting of the Committee it was decided to recommend some slight alterations in the Rules, whereby patients may be admitted daily, by the Secretary and Resident Surgeon,

instead of twice a week only, as now, by the House Committee. Such alterations, having been duly advertised, will be submitted for your consideration.

A system of vigilant visitation, both by the Committee of Management and the House Committee, has been continued throughout the year, and the Committee are glad to state that no complaint of any importance whatever has been heard of from the patients.

Drs. F. Shaw, Walshe, and Mackin deserve the warmest thanks of the Committee and the Subscribers for their valuable assistance throughout the year as Honorary Medical Officers.

With regard to the paid Officers of the Institution, the Committee can only reiterate their report of former years—that they have continued zealously and efficiently to fulfill the duties of their respective offices

I. That the objects of the Infirmary be to afford Medical and OBJECTS.
Surgical aid to poor persons requiring it, for a limited number of paying
patients, and for casualties; but that no person who shall meet with
casualties, and shall be found able to pay for surgical aid, shall receive
further than temporary gratuitous assistance. That the object of the
Benevolent Asylum be the reception of the poor and distressed, with a
view to afford them consolation and assistance.

II. That a portion of the Building shall be set apart for the pur- Appropriation of the Building.
poses of an Infirmary; and the remainder for the purpose of the Benevo-
lent Asylum, at the discretion of the Committee.

III. That the government of the Institution shall be vested in a Institution how governed.
President, two Vice-Presidents, five Trustees, a Treasurer, Governors,
and Subscribers, as hereinafter described.

QUALIFICATIONS AND PRIVILEGES OF GOVERNORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

IV. That every Benefactor of £50 or upwards be a Life Governor, Governors.
and every annual Contributor of £20 an Annual Governor, with liberty
of having one in-patient, or three out-patients, always on the books of
the Institution, subject to the approval of the Committee of Manage-
ment hereinafter mentioned, and provided that the funds of the Institu-
tion admit of the reception of such patients; and any public Institution
contributing £50 in one sum shall be entitled to the privilege of a
Governor for ten years from the date of such contribution.

V. That the Executor, or if more than one, the first-named Ex- Executors, where bequests of £50.
ecutor under any will by which a bequest of £50 or upwards shall be
made to the Institution; and every Minister raising by one or more col- Ministers raising £20.
lections in his Church, in any one year, the sum of £20 or upwards ;
and any other person contributing a similar amount from any other
source, shall have the rights and privileges of a Governor for one year
only, commencing from the January following.

Subscribers.

VI. That every Benefactor of £25 or upwards, in one sum, be a Life Subscriber, with liberty of having one in-patient and three out-patients admitted annually; and every contributor of £1 1s. and upwards annually, an Annual Subscriber, with liberty of having patients admitted as follows: Annual Subscribers of £1 1s. to have *One In-Patient's Ticket and Two Out-Patients' Tickets*; of £2 2s., *Two In-Patients' and Four Out-Patients'*; of £3 3s., *Three In-Patients' and Six Out-Patients'*; of £5 5s., and so on up to £20, *One In-Patients' and Two Out-Patients' Tickets* for every additional £1 1s. Recommendations for admission to be subject to the approval of the House Committee, and to be made by Tickets only, to be issued by the Secretary or Collector, to Subscribers, at the time of their becoming such, and provided that whenever any recommendation cannot be acceded to, from want of room or other cause appearing to the Committee, the ticket used in such recommendation shall be reclaimable by the Subscriber issuing the same. Subscribers shall also have the privilege at any time, on application to the Secretary of exchanging out-patients' tickets for in-patients', and *vice versa*—one in-patient's ticket being equivalent to three out-patients'. These Tickets shall only be used for the recommendation of persons unable to pay for Medical attendance, and shall only be available till 31st January in the year after that in which they are issued.

Subscriptions when due.

Subscribers entitled to vote.

VII That the Annual Subscriptions must be paid in advance for the current year, such year to be computed from the first day of January, in each year, and no Governor or Subscriber will be entitled to any privilege until the subscription be paid. And no person shall be qualified to vote at any meeting of Subscribers, unless he shall have been a Subscriber for the space of six months previous to such meeting; provided always, that where a Subscriber shall have paid his Subscription for the year immediately preceding the year in which any public meeting shall take place, the payment of his Subscription for the then current year at any time before such meeting, shall entitle such Subscriber to vote, as required by Act of Council, 24 Vic., No. 116.

Annual Meeting of Subscribers

VIII. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Subscribers in the month of January in each year, at which all retiring Honorary Officers of the Institution shall be elected for the ensuing year.

Persons not qualified to vote.

IX. That no person shall vote at any meeting while he is a salaried officer or pupil of the Institution.

General Laws.

X. That no general law, nor any repeal of, or alteration in, the existing laws shall be valid, unless the same shall have been passed at the Annual or Special Meeting of the Subscribers.

Committee of Management.

XI. The Committee of Management shall consist of the President Vice-Presidents, Trustees, Treasurer, and Eighteen Governors or Sub-

scribers, to be elected annually; six to form a quorum; and they shall have power to fill up vacancies that may occur in their number during the year, subject to Rule XIV.

XII. It shall be competent at any time for the Committee of Management, at which at least eight members shall be present, or for nine or more Subscribers, by a writing under their hands, to require the Secretary to summon, at the expiration of Fourteen days, a Special Meeting of Subscribers, the occasion of calling such meeting being stated in the requisition; and no business shall be transacted at such Special meeting, except that for which it shall have been summoned. Every such meeting to be called by the Secretary, by advertisement in one of the public newspapers published in Geelong, within three days of his receiving such requisition. Twelve Subscribers shall be necessary to form a General or Special Meeting,

Special Meetings of Subscribers.

XIII. That all Meetings of Subscribers be called by the Secretary, by advertisement, in one of the newspapers published in Geelong, at least one week before the day of meeting.

Meetings of Subscribers called by Advertisement.

XIV. In the event of any vacancy in the office of President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Trustees, or Auditors, the Election of a successor shall take place at a Special Meeting of Subscribers, to be convened by the Committee of Management, which Election shall be by voting tickets, as enjoined by Act of Council, 11 Vic., No. 59, section 9.

Honorary Officers—mode of Election.

XV. And it shall be lawful at all Meetings of Subscribers, for any Life-Governor or Life-Subscriber who became such previous to 1861, as enjoined by Act of Council, to Vote by Proxy, such Proxy being also a Subscriber duly qualified; provided that such Proxy shall have his authority in writing, signed by the Governor or Subscriber; and such authority shall only extend to the one meeting specially named therein. Governors to have three votes; Life-Subscribers three votes; Annual Subscribers of £10 10s. three votes; £5 5s. two votes; of £1 1s. and upwards to £5 5s. one vote.

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

XVI. The Committee of Management shall direct the general business of the Institution; shall frame Bye-Laws for its internal regulation, the same not being repugnant to the General Rules; shall have power to enter into all necessary contracts on behalf of the Institution, and direct payments to be made; and appoint and discharge all paid officers and servants of the Institution. They shall meet at the Institution on the first Wednesday in every month, and on such other days as

they may appoint. They shall have power to admit patients, and to make regulations respecting them. The Chairman of Committee, in case of an equality of votes, to have a casting vote, but no deliberative vote.

*ex officio.*** XVII. The President, Vice-Presidents, Trustees, and Treasurer, shall be members *ex officio* of the Committee, provided they be qualified by subscriptions.

**House Com-
mittee.** XVIII. The Committee of Management shall choose, from among themselves, a House Committee of five, three to form a quorum, who shall meet on Monday and Thursday in each week, at four o'clock p.m. and oftener if necessary; and who shall have power to admit patients and to confirm or otherwise the admission of any cases admitted by the Secretary or Resident Surgeon during the interval of their meetings, to examine and pass and pay the house accounts, to engage and discharge servants, and to regulate the internal management of the Institution, under the direction of the Committee of Management.

**Annual Re-
port.** XIX. The Committee of Management shall present a General Report of the affairs of the Institution at the Annual Meeting of the Subscribers.

Audited.** XX. The accounts of the Institution shall be audited once in every year, and presented at the Annual Meeting of Subscribers.

HONORARY MEDICAL STAFF.

**Their quali-
fication.** XXI. The Honorary Medical Staff shall consist of four duly qualified general practitioners, to be elected annually. No one shall be eligible for the appointment unless he can produce a diploma from a recognised British University, or from one of the Royal Colleges of Surgeons London, Edinburgh, or Dublin, or the Faculty of Physicians of Glasgow, together with a certificate from the Medical Board of Victoria.

The Resident Surgeon shall have the charge of all patients admitted; but the Honorary Medical Staff may visit the Institution at any time, and in case of their observing any neglect of or inattention to the patients it shall be their duty to report the same to the House Committee forthwith.

**Rotation of
Duty.** XXIII. Two of the Honorary Medical Staff shall attend in weekly rotation, on such days and at such hours as may be most convenient, for consultation on the treatment of the patients; and they shall arrange the rotation of attendance.

XXIV. The Honorary Medical Staff of the week shall attend for Consultation to be held. consultation on all important cases; and should any capital operation be deemed necessary the whole of the Honorary Medical Staff shall be summoned for further consultation (except in cases of emergency) previous to the operation being performed, when, if then decided on, the whole of the Honorary Medical Staff shall be requested to attend.

ADMISSION OF PATIENTS INTO THE INFIRMARY.

PATIENTS.

XXV. That accidents and such cases of decided emergency only, as Admission into the Infirmary. in the opinion of the Resident Surgeon cannot be delayed, be received into the Infirmary at any time without ticket; and that the admission of patients in ordinary cases recommended by Subscribers' tickets be daily (Sundays excepted) between the hours of NINE and TWELVE o'clock in the forenoon, by the Secretary and Resident Surgeon, or either of them, such admission to be temporary and subject to the approval of the House Committee at its next meeting.

ADMISSION OF PAYING PATIENTS.

XXVI. That Paying Patients be admitted on the usual days of admission, without ticket, at the discretion of the Committee. Patients to be admitted

XXVII. That the amount chargeable to each patient shall be at the discretion of the Committee; and shall be paid in advance, or at the discretion of the Committee. Amount to be charged.

XXVIII. That the general rules and regulations of the Institution shall be applicable to and strictly observed by all paying patients received into the Institution. Rules applicable to paying Patients

PERSONS NOT ADMISSIBLE.

XXIX. No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement; no person insane; no one having a contagious or infectious disease; no one subject to epilepsy; nor any one who in the opinion of the Resident Surgeon might receive equal benefit as an out-patient, shall be admitted; and no child under five years of age shall be admitted, except from an accident or for a surgical operation. Provided that the House Committee or Officers of the Institution shall have discretionary power to admit such prohibited cases, and shall report upon the exercise of such power at any time to the next general meeting of the Committee of Management. Persons not admissible.

ADMISSION OF INMATES INTO THE BENEVOLENT ASYLUM.

BENEVOLENT ASYLUM.

XXX. The admission of Inmates into the Benevolent Asylum is ordinarily restricted to Monday and Thursday in each week, but a Admission of Inmates.

meeting of the House Committee may be convened at any time to consider authentic cases of utter destitution.

admissible. XXXI. No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement; no person insane; no child under twelve years of age; no one having a contagious or infectious disease shall be admitted.

Ministers of
Religion. XXXII. Ministers of Religion shall have free access to persons of their respective denominations, at such times as shall be appointed by the Committee of Management; and when a patient requests that any minister may be sent for, his wish shall be immediately complied with.

struction. XXXIII. That the instruction of the patients in the Institution be left to the recognised religious teachers of the various denominations to which the patients belong; and it shall be understood that controversial works be prohibited.

His Duties. XXXIV. He shall attend all Special, General, and Committee Meetings; he shall take minutes of the proceedings, and transcribe them carefully into books to be kept for that purpose, and he shall carry out the directions of such meetings in the particulars incident to his department.

Correspondence and
Accounts. XXXV. He shall conduct the correspondence and other clerical business of his department, and he shall enter and keep the accounts of the Institution, under the direction of the Committee.

COLLECTOR.

Pay. XXXVI. He shall be under the direction of the House Committee, and shall collect subscriptions and donations to the Institution, and pay over the same to the Treasurer, at least once in every week, and render account of the amount received by him since the last payment.

ALTERATION OF RULES.

Alteration
of Rules. XXXVII. These Rules shall not be altered, except at a Special or General Meeting of Subscribers, due notice of any proposed alterations having been given, in accordance with Rule XII.

REGULATIONS

RESIDENT SURGEON.

1. No Candidate shall be eligible for the appointment of Resident Surgeon unless he produces a diploma from either of the Royal Colleges of Surgeons of London, Edinburgh, or Dublin, together with a certificate from the Medical Board of Victoria. Qualifications.

2. He shall reside in the house, and shall not leave it except on necessary occasions. He shall not be absent more than three hours at one time, or after twelve o'clock at night, without the express leave of the House Committee. In case of absence, he shall inform the House Steward and Dispenser where he may be found. Regulations respecting absence.

N.B.—He and the House Steward and Dispenser shall never be absent at the same time.

3. He shall have the charge of all patients admitted, and shall report to the House Committee at its next meeting any patient who may have been disorderly. He shall make a special report to the House Committee on every patient who may have been two months in the Institution; and he shall also report any case that may, after consultation, be considered incurable, by the Honorary Medical Staff, to be dealt with as the Committee may see fit. Charge of the Patients Report disorderly. Patients two months in Institution to be reported. Incurable cases to be reported.

4. He shall, have the general superintendence of the internal affairs of the Institution, under the direction of the House Committee. Internal control

Servants, He shall preserve order and Sobriety, and in case of insubordination or gross default of duty on the part of any servant, he shall suspend or discharge such servant until the next meeting of the House Committee; and if necessary he shall provisionally hire a substitute for such servant so suspended or discharged, and he shall report his having done so with the cause of such suspension or discharge, to the House Committee at their next meeting; but he shall in no case absolutely discharge, or permanently hire, any servant of the Institution without the sanction of the House Committee.

Medicines, medical instruments, furniture, &c., charge of them, inventory of them. 5. He shall have charge of and keep the surgical instruments in proper order; and shall be accountable for the medicines, medical and surgical instruments, utensils and stores, except such as are in charge of the House Steward and Dispenser, or Matron; and he shall prepare an inventory in the month of December in every year, and at such other times as the Committee may direct, of all furniture, utensils, medicines, and stores, under his charge; and such inventory shall be recorded from year to year, in a book to be kept for that purpose.

Books to be kept. 6. He shall enter regularly, in proper books to be kept for such purposes, the names of the patients as they are admitted and discharged, and note the nature and the history of their diseases while under treatment; the receipt, issue, and expenditure, loss or breakage, of medicines, medical instruments, and other things in his charge, and the disbursement of petty cash; and he shall have such books ready at all times for the inspection of the House Committee; and he shall attend the weekly meetings of the House Committee; and he shall receive all money and other property belonging to patients, and shall account for the same weekly to the House Committee.

Attend the weekly meetings of the House Committee. Patients' Money.

Visit each Patient. Complaints. 7. He shall visit each patient morning and evening, and shall enquire if the treatment prescribed has been attended to, and if any cause of complaint exist. Should any patient have a complaint to prefer, he shall enter it immediately in the Patients' Complaint Book, in the presence of the Wardsman or Nurse of the Ward, and he shall lay such book before the House Committee at each meeting.

Condition of the Wards, &c. 8. He shall on his visits to the wards examine their condition with respect to cleanliness, temperature, and ventilation; and he shall observe if the wardsmen and nurses have done their duty.

Bed Tickets. 9. He shall affix to the bed of each patient a card, stating the patient's name, age, religion, disease, date of admission, and diet.

10. He shall write, or cause to be written, upon every medicine dispensed by him, or the dispenser, the name of the patient for whom it is prescribed, and the time at and the manner in which it is to be administered, and this however frequently the same medicine may be repeated; and he shall cause the medicines to be administered as directed; and he shall keep, or cause to be kept, a proper supply of the necessary apparatus for cases of accident or emergency, ready for immediate use.

11. He shall inspect the diet of the patients, and see that it is of good quality and properly prepared, and such as is ordered; and that patients do not partake of food, liquor, or medicines, except that prescribed.

12. He shall procure such articles in small quantities, in his department, as may be required during the week; but he shall not purchase any article, or enter into any contract for the Institution, exceeding £2, without the sanction of the Committee; and he shall, on the last days of February, May, August and November, prepare and submit to the House Committee, a list of medicines, medical or surgical instruments, utensils and stores, as may be required during the ensuing quarter.

13. He shall regularly consult with the Honorary Medical Staff on any important case, in accordance with 24 of General Rules. And he shall afford them every facility for examining and for offering opinion on the treatment of all cases admitted; and shall record the result of every consultation in the Case-Book.

14. He shall give due notice in writing to the Honorary Medical Staff when a consultation is to be held or an operation performed, and consult their desires with regard to the performance of capital operations.

15. The Committee of Management shall have the power at any time to require the Resident Surgeon to give up private practice, should he have any.

HOUSE STEWARD AND DISPENSER.

16. The House Steward and Dispenser shall live in the house, and shall not leave, except on necessary occasions, and with the consent of the Resident Surgeon. He shall not be absent for more than three hours at one time, nor after ten o'clock at night, without the leave of the House Committee.

N.B.—He and the Matron shall never be absent at the same time.

Superintendence of the Matron, Nurses, and Servants; report any failure to the Resident Surgeon.

17. He shall have the immediate superintendence of the Matron, Wardsmen, Nurses, and Servants, and shall see that they do their duty; and he shall enforce order, sobriety, personal cleanliness, neatness, and obedience to orders on their part. In case of any misbehaviour, disobedience, or neglect of duty by any of them, he shall at once report the same to the Resident Surgeon or House Committee.

Wards, &c., to be kept in a proper state of cleanliness and order.

18. He shall see that the wards, and other parts of the house, and the grounds, are kept in a proper state of cleanliness and order.

Things in his charge; inventory; list of articles in charge of Wardsmen, Nurses, &c.

19. He shall have the charge of and be accountable for the furniture, bedding, linen, glass, cutlery, cooking and kitchen utensils, medicines and stores; and he shall make an inventory of the same in a book to be kept for that purpose, in which he shall regularly enter the receipt, loss, or breakage of any article; and he shall, on the last days of June and December in each year, and at such other times as the House Committee may require, prepare and submit to the Committee an inventory of everything placed under the charge of any Wardsman, Nurse, or Servant; and shall, on either of them leaving the Institution, require them to give an account of all that they may have had under their care.

Receive Stores and supplies; and dispense the consumption and daily enter the amount in a book. Oversight of provisions, stores, and utensils.

20. He shall receive the stores and supplies furnished by the Contractors and Tradesmen, and he shall see that they correspond in description, quality, and quantity with the tenders and orders; and in case they do not, he shall report accordingly to the House Committee, at its next meeting; and he shall weigh and measure out the provisions and other necessaries required for the day's consumption, and he shall enter the amount regularly in a book to be kept for that purpose; and he shall attend to the cutting up and distribution of food to the patients when cooked; and he shall not suffer any of the provisions, utensils, or stores, to be wasted or carried away; and he shall prepare the usual monthly return of diets, receipt and issue of stores, &c., and accounts as may be required by the Committee; and he shall have the clothes of all patients cleansed on admission, if requisite, and he shall make out an inventory of the same.

Patients' clothes to be cleansed, and an inventory kept.

Dispense prescriptions.

21. He shall dispense the prescriptions of the Resident Surgeon, and shall carry out the instructions of the Resident Surgeon in the surgery, and otherwise fulfil the duties of Dispenser.

MATRON.

22. She shall be subject to the same regulations, respecting *Absence,* living in the house and absence therefrom, as the House Steward and Dispenser.

N.B.—She and the House Steward and Dispenser shall never be absent at the same time.

23. She shall see that the Nurses and Female Servants do their duty; and shall report any neglect or disobedience of orders on their part to the House Steward and Dispenser. *Superintendence of Nurses and female servants.*

24. She shall visit each ward daily, and shall see that the beds, linen and clothes of the patients, are clean and in good order; and shall cause such of the bedding, &c., as require it to be replaced by others, and thoroughly cleansed and repaired where necessary. *Visit and inspect the wards daily.*

25. She shall superintend they laundry, and shall be accountable to *Laundry* the House Steward and Dispenser for the return from the laundry of all clothes sent to be washed or cleansed, keeping an account of everything taken to the laundry and received therefrom.

26. She shall see that all patients' clothes, as they are admitted, are cleansed and put carefully away; and shall enter in a book a list of all patients' clothes as they are received, and procure the receipt of each patient for their clothes when they leave. And shall not permit any of the patients' clothes to be removed from the store but in her presence. *Patients' clothes, care of.*

27. She shall personally superintend the cooking of all food for the inmates, and shall generally discharge the duties of Matron as shall be directed by the Committee. *To superintend the cooking.*

WARDSMEN, NURSES AND SERVANTS.

28. The Wardsmen and Nurses shall be constantly in their wards, and regular in their attendance upon the patients. *Attendance of Wardsmen and Nurses.*

29. They shall obey the Resident Surgeon, House Steward and Dispenser, and Matron. They shall behave with tenderness to all the patients, with civility and respect to strangers; they shall withdraw from the wards when the House Committee enter them, unless particularly requested to remain; and they shall take no presents or gratuity in money or otherwise from their patients, their friends or strangers, who may visit the Institution, on any pretence whatever. Infringement of the rule will be subject to instant dismissal. *Their deportment; when to withdraw from the Wards; not to receive presents or gratuity.*

- Permission for temporary absence. 30. No Wardsman, Nurse, or Servant, shall leave the Institution without permission of the Resident Surgeon or House Steward and Dispenser.
- Personal cleanliness; by what time in the morning Wards to be cleansed, and dirt, &c., to be removed. 31. The Wardsmen and Nurses shall be particular to observe personal cleanliness; they shall have their respective wards swept and thoroughly cleansed, and all dirt and rubbish removed from them by seven o'clock in the morning in the summer, and before eight o'clock in the morning in the winter.
- Breakfast. 32. They shall serve up breakfast to the patients at eight o'clock in the morning.
- Details to promote comfort and cleanliness. 33. They shall have the several chamber utensils scalded every morning, and scoured as often as may be necessary, and kept out of the wards during the day, unless specially required.
34. They shall pay great attention to the bedding of the patients, and have the mattresses thoroughly aired and dried when necessary, and the sheets, blankets, and counterpanes renewed as often as required.
35. They shall not allow clothes to be hung, nor dirt, or anything to be thrown out of the windows.
- Medicines, diet, &c. 36. They shall administer to the patients at the times directed, the medicines and the diet prescribed, and they shall not suffer them to take any which are not prescribed, and they shall be careful to explain to the patients the instructions of the Resident Surgeon.
- Regulations respecting visitors, &c. 37. They shall not permit patients to receive from visitors medicines, victuals, or liquor of any kind; nor allow any portion of medicine or diet, or any other thing, to be removed from the wards by the patients or visitors, without an order from the Resident Surgeon.
- Empty phials &c. Food not used. To attend at the Dispensary for medicines. 38. They shall be careful to collect and carry to the House Steward and Dispenser, all empty phials, gallipots, bandages, &c.; and to the Matron, any article of diet not consumed by the patients; and they shall attend at the Dispensary at the time appointed to receive medicines and instructions.
- Watch and report patients' state and symptoms. 39. They shall watch attentively the state and symptoms of the patients, more especially in urgent or uncommon cases, and report these distinctly to the Resident Surgeon, or in his absence to the House Steward and Dispenser; or in case of females, to the Matron.

40. They shall not admit any stranger into any ward without the permission of the Resident Surgeon or the Secretary. Admission of strangers.

41. One Wardsman or Nurse in rotation shall be on duty from eight o'clock every night to six o'clock the following morning, and shall visit each ward once in every two hours, or more frequently if necessary; and shall pay due attention to such patients as may require it, and should there be occasion, shall communicate with the Resident Surgeon. Wardsmen or Nurse on night duty.

42. All Wardsmen, Nurses, and Servants shall be obedient to the Regulations of the Institution, and they shall report immediately to the Resident Surgeon, House Steward and Dispenser, or Matron, any impropriety of conduct, or infringement of them, by any patient, visitor, or other person; and if such complaint be not properly attended to, they shall report the same to the House Committee at its next meeting. Wardsmen, Nurses, and Servants to be obedient to the Regulation; report impropriety and infringement.

PATIENTS.

43. Patients shall conduct themselves orderly, and shall strictly observe all the directions of the Resident Surgeon, House Steward and Dispenser, Matron, Wardsmen, and Nurses. Conduct; observe direction.

44. They shall take their medicines at the time directed, and they shall take no other medicines than those prescribed; and they shall not conceal nor put away any portion of the medicine or diet administered to them. Medicines and diet.

45. No one shall leave his or her ward, and go into another ward or apartment, nor leave the House, nor remain out for a longer time than is granted, nor shall introduce visitors, nor receive medicines, victuals, liquors, or anything, without express leave of the Resident Surgeon or Secretary. Details respecting liberty to leave the Wards, absence, visitors, &c.

46. They shall not play at cards or dice, nor gamble or smoke nor spit on the floor, nor deface or injure any part of the Ward, nor any furniture, bedding, or clothing therein, nor sing, blaspheme, or use rude or indecent language. Details respecting cleanliness and conduct

47. No patient shall give reward or gratuity to any of the Wardsmen, Nurses, or other Servants. Not to give reward or gratuity.

48. Any Patient having any cause of complaint shall make the same known to the Resident Surgeon, whose duty it shall be to enter such complaint immediately, in the presence of the Nurse or Wardsman of the Ward, in a book kept for that purpose, which book shall be laid before the House Committee at each meeting. Regulations respecting complaints.

Employment of convalescent patients. 49. Patients judged by the Resident Surgeon sufficiently convalescent to be able to assist in the work of the Institution shall be so employed.

Regulations respecting rising and sitting up. 50. Patients shall not sit up after Eight o'clock in the winter, or Nine o'clock in the summer; and all Patients considered by the Resident Surgeon able to do so, shall rise by Seven o'clock in the summer, and before Eight o'clock in the winter.

Venereal patients. 51. No venereal patients shall be admitted a second time, having been once under treatment and cured.

Patients offending against the regulations to be discharged. 52. Every patient offending against the above Regulations will be discharged for irregularity.

VISITORS.

When admitted; visits limited to one hour. 53. Visitors are admitted into the Institution on Sunday and Thursday in each week, between the hours of three and five o'clock in the afternoon, but no visitor is allowed to remain more than one hour. Not more than two visitors will be allowed to see each patient, except on special occasions, and by the leave of the Resident Surgeon or Secretary.

Special visits 54. Visitors may be admitted on special occasions by a written order from a member of the House Committee, addressed to the Resident Surgeon or Secretary.

Regulations respecting visits. 55. Visitors will not be allowed to go into any ward without the leave of the Resident Surgeon or Secretary; and every visitor must retire when requested.

56. They will not be permitted to give to, or leave with any patient any money, medicines, food, or liquor of any kind, nor any other thing, without the express sanction of the Resident Surgeon. Any one doing so will not be again admitted.

Not to give money or gratuity. 57. No visitor shall give to any servant of the Institution any money or gratuity of any kind.

Not to interfere, &c. Quietness. 58. Visitors are requested not to interfere with the Wardsmen or Nurses, and not to disturb the patients by loud talking or unnecessary noise.

59. No male visitor shall visit the wards for females without the leave of the Resident Surgeon or Secretary, and shall then only be permitted to remain a quarter of an hour.

Respecting visitors violating the regulations or behaving improperly. 60. Any visitor violating any of the Regulations of the Institution, or behaving with impropriety, will be compelled to retire, and will not be re-admitted without special leave from the House Committee.
