TO THE GOVERNORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN.—In presenting to you their Forty-first Annual Report, your Committee is pleased to be able to inform you, that in spite of the general depression the claims of the Institution have been generously recognized by the inhabitants of the town and district. It reflects great credit on the subscribers that, whilst other similar institutions are having their usefulness impaired and are drifting more and more into debt, the Geelong Infirmary and Benevolent Asylum is in the proud position at the close of one of the worst financial years, which the colony has ever experienced, of having paid its way during the past twelve months, and actually reduced the bank overdraft with which the year was commenced by the sum of £93 5s.

The thanks of the Committee are most heartily accorded to the subscribers for the way in which by their donations they have supported the Institution during the year just ended, and it is hoped that this support will be marked by its continuance during the ensuing twelve months.

During the year ended June 30th, 1921 cases have received relief. Full particulars are given in the following tables:—

INCOME AND EXPENDITURE.

According to the Balance Sheet (duly audited) the total receipts for maintenance purposes were £5522. 3s. 6d., and £500 was transferred from the Endowment Fund current account towards the payment of new closets and baths erected during the year.

The total receipts from all sources amounted to £6022. 3s. 6d., and the total expenditure under all heads to £5929. 8s. 10d.

Thus the year's income exceeds the expenditure by £92 14s. 8d.

The Bank Overdraft on July 1st, 1892, was £242. 7s. 1d., and on 30th June, 1893, when the year under review closed, it was £149. 2s. 1d.

CHARGE FOR DRUGS TO OUT PATIENTS.

On 1st July last year a charge of 6d. was inaugurated for Medicine to Out-Patients.

This has been found to work admirably, and during the past twelve months the sum of £57 ls. has been received from 1232 Out-Patients who have attended on 4057 occasions. During the same period, on 1775 occasions, patients have been exempted, and payment has been made on 2282 occasions, making a total of 4057 Out-Patients' attendances.

It may be here stated that every care is taken by the Secretary to prevent this charge becoming distressful to any really poor patient, and each case is dealt with by him personally on its merits and exemption granted wherever deemed necessary.

All cases sent by the Salvation Army Home have been treated free.

ENDOWMENT FUND.

This Fund, which was stated in the last Report to have a balance to its credit of £9823 5s. 7d., has not been added to during the past year, as no Legacies over £50 have come to the Institution.

Prior to the separation of the Maintenance and Endowment Funds at the Bank a sum of £1968 0s. 9d. was lent to the Maintenance account.

The Inspector of Charities, at his recent visit, recommended that this should be made an absolute transfer, and your Committee has adopted this suggestion and written off the amount.

From the statement appended it will be seen, therefore, that the amount actually to the credit of the Fund is £7354 0s. 11d.

GENERAL.

With a view to stirring up more interest in the Hospital tables will be found appended, showing the Districts from which In-door Patients, Out-door Patients, and Inmates of the Benevolent Asylum have been drawn during the past year, and, also, what measure of support has been given to the Hospital by such Districts as (1) Private Contributors, (2) Municipal Bodies, and (3) through Church Collections.

Other statistical tables of interest are added showing average cost per head during year just ended; comparative cost under different heads of expenditure during the past three years; the number of In-Patients, Out-Patients, and Benevolent Asylum Inmates received each year since the foundation of the Hospital in 1852; and the number of Patients treated from 1877 to 1893 with yearly amounts received from them.

IMPROVEMENTS, &c.

During the past year new bath rooms, closets, and latrines have been erected at the suggestion of the Inspector of Charities at a cost of over £500, and have been found a great improvement on the before existing arrangements at the Institution.

To meet the cost of these new buildings, £500 was transferred by your Committee from the Endowment Fund to the General Maintenance Account for the current year.

Much other work has been done, and many improvements introduced since the issue of our last Report.

Electric Bells have been attached to the Lunacy Wards, thereby ensuring the safety of the attendants.

Ventilating appliances have been added to the windows in the Benevolent Wards, and also Wards Nos. 1, 2, and 3, which have much improved their sanitariness.

Austral Automatic Gas Burners have been used, which it is believed has made a considerable difference in the consumption of gas.

An incinerator for the destruction of typhoid excreta, and a vaporator for fumigation of wards have been procured, and are considered most valuable in preventing the propagating of disease.

Many repairs of a substantial character have been executed at no little expense.

The spouting round (No. 9 ward) has been taken down and renewed.

The asphalt paths have been repaired.

Three new fire hoses have been provided.

A new boot shop has been built by the Institution carpenter for the use of the man who repairs the inmates' boots, and this is in the nature of a decided improvement, as the room formerly used was small and ill ventilated.

The patients' clothes stores have been enlarged.

A painter has been on the staff for some months and has done much necessary painting and white washing both inside and outside the buildings.

Amongst other work done by him may be mentioned — the Nurses' sleeping quarters, painted and re-varnished; Wards 9 and 14; the Lodge; the Servants' Room; the Nurses' Room, Ward 11; Lavatory and Entrance Lobby Ward 11; the small diphtheria Ward; the Lobby and two Bath Rooms, Ward 12; and much other work both inside and outside.

COMFORT OF PATIENTS.

With regard to our Patients—a move in the right direction was made on the 1st February last by the introduction of a new dietary scale. This provides that all Hospital Patients shall receive fresh butter, and at the same time introduces such changes as promote economy by the prevention of waste.

24 Wire-woven Mattresses have been procured in addition to those previously in use. These are both more comfortable and more sanitary than the old fashioned straw palliasses. In course of time these latter will be entirely done away with (except in the surgical wards.)

New Food Trays were introduced some months since, and these being heated with hot water and having close fitting lids the Patients now receive their food hot in the wards.

REPORT OF INSPECTOR OF CHARITIES.

The copy of the Inspector of Charities Report to the Treasurer of the Colony dated May 23, 1893, was received from the Under Treasurer, and was very satisfactory.

His suggestions have, as a whole, been carried out.

The recommendation that a dining room be built for the use of the Benevolent Asylum Inmates has been favourably received by your Committee, and will be acted upon.

His concluding paragraph is as follows:—

“I am pleased to say that I found the Institution improved generally, clean, and orderly, and the Inmates apparently well cared for and contented.”

NEW BUILDINGS.

The subject of new Hospital Buildings has been considered by your Committee on several occasions during the past year, and it is now endeavouring to acquire extra ground near the existing buildings.

Should this land be obtainable, it is possible that the present site will be permanently adopted, and such new buildings as are absolutely necessary will be proceeded with forthwith.

MONTHLY VISITORS.

According to Bye-Law, No. 31, it is ordered that the Committee shall, from among themselves, appoint two members (not being members of the House Committee) to be visitors for the month, who shall, at the next monthly meeting, report the state of the Institution as found by them at their visits.

The Reports of such visitors for the year ended June 30th, 1893, here follow:—

July 14th, 1892.

The Rev. A. Davidson reported that he had visited all the wards, and was struck by the general appearance of order and cleanliness, and comfort. The judicious use of paint in some of the wards had made them much brighter. The food dispensed at meal times was wholesome and nutritious, and well cooked. The sitting room, furnished for the comfort of the nurses, was very cosy and cheerful. Altogether he was satisfied that the Institution was in a very satisfactory condition. Mr. Martin, who endorsed this report, recommended that some attention should be given to the roof of the portico, which seemed to be in a leaky condition.

August 11th, 1892.

Mr. Joshua Vines, on behalf of himself and Mr. W. Bradley, reported that the Hospital had been visited during the time that the patients were partaking of their tea. The butter and the bread were tasted, and found to be of good quality, and everything was neat and clean. It was noticed that the sinks in the scullery required re-lining, and electric bells, as recommended by the Inspector of Charities in his report, should be supplied to the Lunacy Ward. New closets were urgently required; and if the funds permitted, the floor of the Committee Room should have a new oil-cloth put on to replace that on at present.

September 15th, 1892.

Mr. Jas. Strong stated that with Mr. Reid he had made an inspection of the Hospital and the cooking arrangements. Everything had been found highly satisfactory.

October 13th, 1892.

The Rev. A. Webb and Mr. Pride, the visitors for the month, submitted a report of their inspection. They stated that everything within the Institution was in satisfactory order, and reflected great credit upon the competency of the managing staff. The determination of the House Committee to give all the employees a holiday every year was greatly appreciated.

November 17th, 1892.

The report of Messrs Shannon and Munday's visit to the Institution during the past month was not received by the Secretary.

December 15th, 1892.

The Rev. J. H. Toms, on behalf of himself and Mr. J. H. Connor, said that the Hospital was visited on the 21st ult. The wards were found in excellent order and well ventilated, while the patients expressed themselves as well satisfied. The Benevolents were having tea at the time, and no complaints were heard of any kind; they were well satisfied with their food, and appeared quite cheerful. The kitchen was clean, and the same applied to the whole Institution.

Mr. Shannon apologised for having omitted to supply a report at the previous meeting. He mentioned that he had found everything in perfect order.

January 12th, 1893.

The Rev. Canon Goodman reported, that since the previous meeting of the Committee, he had visited the Hospital four or five times, and had found the wards and premises in an unusually clean and very satisfactory state. The new baths, erected at the male and female wards for the benefit of the Inmates of the Benevolent Asylum, were a great boon. Mr Grey stated that he had also visited the Institution, and could endorse the remarks of the Rev. Canon Goodman.

February 9th, 1893.

The Rev. A. R. Edgar stated that he had visited the Hospital three or four times during the past few months. He found everything perfectly clean, and no complaints were made either by the Hospital or Benevolent Patients. He noticed a number of tin pannicans, and suggested that they should be replaced with delf mugs. Dr. Small, the other visitor, also gave a satisfactory report.

March 16th, 1893.

The visitors for last month, Mr. Geo. Martin and Mr. Joshua Vines, forwarded their report, which was to the effect that no complaints had been made to them when they visited the Institution. Everything was found in a most satisfactory condition.

April 14th, 1893.

On behalf of himself and Mr. Bradley, the Rev. A. Davidson stated that the wards had been inspected and found to be pictures of cleanliness and order. They were much struck with the improvements that had been effected, relative to the sanitary conditions and comfort of the Inmates. The new out-buildings would greatly contribute towards a healthy state, and were a credit to the Institution; while the bath rooms were decidedly comfortable. Many of the Infirmity Patients had expressed their gratefulness for having such a comfortable home where so much kindness was extended to them.

May 11th, 1893.

Mr. W. Reid reported that he and Mr. James Strong had visited the Hospital on the previous day and found everything in excellent order, which reflected much credit on the Officers of the Institution.

June 14th, 1893.

Rev. A. W. Webb reported, in company with Mr. J. Munday I visited the Hospital and its attachments. We were pleased with all we saw. The uniform cleanliness and good order which have been characteristic of the present management found exemplification in every department. We were particularly pleased with the new bath rooms and the closets; also with the endeavour to make every part of the buildings as clean and attractive looking as paint and colouring can make them.

FIRE ARRANGEMENTS.

A short time since, a fire broke out in the new bath rooms attached to the Female Benevolent Ward; but owing to the fire buckets in the adjoining ward being kept full, and the promptitude of your staff, it was speedily extinguished.

The damage done amounted to £7 in a wooden building insured for £70.

ENTERTAINMENTS.

During the year several Entertainments have been held in aid of the Institution.

Amongst others may be mentioned the Bazaar at the Town Hall, in August, 1892, which realized £36 3s. 6d., under the joint Secretaryship of Misses Peebles and Tymms; and the Entertainment recently given at the Exhibition Building by the Geelong College Athletic Club, on which occasion half of the net proceeds, amounting to £10, was presented to the Hospital.

Your Committee hopes, that in up-country townships, the way will be seen to promote Entertainments in aid of the funds of the Institution, whereby the Hospital may be benefited; and at the same time the inhabitants of the district may enjoy themselves.

COLLECTIONS IN STATE SCHOOLS.

On Hospital Saturday, 1892, by permission of the Hon. the Minister of Education, an appeal was made to the children attending the State Schools in the district.

This appeal was made at the last moment and was nevertheless well responded to, the sum of £26 1s. 10d. being received.

A double object is achieved in this, viz: a pecuniary benefit to the Institution, and an awakening in the children the knowledge that they have others to care for besides themselves.

In the coming year it is to be sincerely hoped that the appeal will be still more largely responded to.

STAFF.

The Officers of the Institution remain the same as for the past two years.

Your Committee considers the services of the Secretary and Superintendent, Resident Surgeon, and Matron worthy of especial thanks. Without doubt, owing to the exertions of the Secretary and Superintendent in particular, and the economical management by all the Officers mentioned, under the supervision of the House Committee, is due the present favourable financial position of the Institution.

The comfort of the Staff has been considered in more ways than one.

In July of last year a sitting room was provided and neatly furnished for the Nurses, and another room placed at the disposal of the remainder of the Female Staff, and this has been found to work admirably.

For the whole Staff, an annual holiday after 12 months' service has been arranged, and this has, without doubt, given universal satisfaction, and enabled the work of the Institution to be carried on with renewed vigour.

PROBATIONERS.

Many applications from young ladies desirous of serving as Probationers in your Hospital have been received by your House Committee, but it has not been deemed expedient to appoint them, as your Committee has not the accommodation necessary for the reception of such probationers.

With the erection of new Hospital Buildings, it is hoped that in the whole plan, accommodation may be arranged for the reception of Probationers; thereby conferring a benefit upon the Hospital and the district—upon the Hospital by causing a saving of expense in the nursing staff, and on the district by providing a school for the training of young women as nurses.

BENEVOLENT ASYLUM ACCOMMODATION.

During the current year a large number of cases, both male and female, have had to be refused admittance to the Benevolent Asylum.

It must be remembered that, according to the Government measurement, there is only room for 101 beds, and during the year under review the daily average has been about 108, being 7 above the statutory number.

In spite of this fact, we receive numerous applications for the admission of suitable cases which cannot be received owing to the lack of accommodation.

The only way out of the difficulty is the erection of more Benevolent Asylum accommodation, as the number of fit subjects for admission in the district largely exceeds the available accommodation.

With the increased age of the colony there is bound to be an increased number of aged destitute persons, who must either be received into Benevolent Asylums or sent to gaol as vagrants; this latter is, besides being wholly against the practice of civilized communities, an uneconomical way out of the difficulty.

In Benevolent Asylums the average cost per head will be about £15 per annum.

In Gaols the average cost will be about £35 per annum.

Thus the more civilized way of treating the destitute aged will effect a saving of about £20 per head per annum.

ALTERATION IN BYE-LAWS.

In November, 1892, your Bye-laws were altered, enabling your Committee to issue tickets for admission of patients to ministers of Churches making collections on Hospital Sunday.

This is deemed a step in the right direction, and prevents the creation of faggot votes.

The ministers or laymen making a collection under this Bye-law only obtain one vote in respect of their whole collections.

CHRISTMAS TREAT.

Our Xmas appeal in 1892 was as well responded to as in the previous year, and we were thereby enabled to give our Inmates a real good Xmas Dinner, and also a Tea at the New Year.

Through the kindness of the Chairman of the Gardens Committee, Colonel J. L. Price, we were able to have the rooms decorated with pot plants and cut flowers, and thus, for the time being, the old people were taken out of their every day surroundings and made to feel more like guests at a public dinner than the Inmates of a charitable Institution.

On behalf of the old people, the thanks of the Committee are tendered to the public for enabling so much to be done at the festive season.

VOTES OF THANKS.

The thanks of the subscribers are again due, and on their behalf are hereby voted by the Committee to the members of the Honorary Medical Staff for their constant attendances on both In and Out-Patients.

The members of the Flower Mission have, during the past year, under the guidance of the indefatigable Mrs Hitchcock, made their weekly visits to the Hospital, thereby conveying great cheer and comfort to our patients, and the thanks of your Committee are hereby tendered to them for their labor of love.

The thanks of your Committee are offered to the proprietors of the "Argus," "Age," "Geelong Advertiser," "Geelong Times," and "Ballarat Star" for the daily gratuitous supply of their papers.

The Carnival Minstrels and Geelong Mutual Improvement Society have given Concerts to the Inmates during the year, and have given much pleasure by so doing, and your thanks are due to the promoters for the services they have so willingly rendered.

COMMITTEES.

During the past year 13 Meetings of the General Committee, 47 Meetings of the House Committee, 13 of the Finance Committee, and 2 of the joint Building and Finance Committees have been held.

A List of Attendances is appended, which will prove that the members of your Committees have not been unmindful of the confidence reposed in them, and the responsibility resting upon them.

The duties of the House Committee being felt to be extremely onerous, a departure has been made from the usual custom by electing it for six months only instead of twelve months, and this has been found to work satisfactorily.

In February, 1893, Mr H. T. Howard retired, and the vacancy thus created was filled by the appointment of Mr W. Pride.

The arduous duties of the House Committee and regular attendance of members to such duties deserve your recognition and thanks.

The retiring members of your Committee are Mr F. S. Orchard (who forfeited his seat through non-attendance, and was subsequently re-elected by your Committee), Messrs Munday, Gardiner, and W. Bradley, the Rev. A. R. Edgar (who has left Geelong), and Mr J. H. Grey.

These gentlemen are all open to re-election, and the six vacancies thus made will have to be filled at the Annual Meeting.

EXTRACTS FROM BYE-LAWS.

OBJECTS.

Bye-Law No. 2.

That the objects of the Infirmary be to afford medical and surgical aid to poor persons requiring it; to a limited number of paying patients whose admission, under special circumstances, may be sanctioned by the Committee of Management; and for casualities; but no person who shall meet with casualities and shall be found able to pay for surgical aid shall receive further than temporary assistance. That the objects of the Benevolent Asylum be the reception of the poor and distressed, with a view to afford them consolation and assistance.

APPROPRIATION OF BUILDINGS.

Bye-Law No. 3.

That a portion of one of the buildings shall be set apart for the purpose of an Infirmary, and a portion for the purpose of the Benevolent Asylum, at the discretion of the Committee, who shall also be empowered to permit the reception of Lunatics on remand for medical examination in a ward erected for that purpose.

CONSTITUTION.

Bye-Law No. 4.

The Corporation shall consist of a President, two Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Governors and Contributors.

QUALIFICATION, DESIGNATION AND PRIVILEGES OF BENEFACTORS.

Bye-Law No. 5:

The following shall be the qualification, designation, and privileges of Governors, Contributors, and Honorary Collectors, viz:—

£50 personal contribution in one year—	Life Governor.
£20 " " "	Life Subscriber.
£50 Bequest, under will first named, or acting executor (bequest under will) under such will.	} Governor for one year.

£20 society, association, or company }
 collecting or paying in one year } Life Subscriber.
 (to nominate for each £20 }
 collected or paid.)

£1 and upwards, Minister of Church or } Honorary
 Layman collecting in one year. } Collector.

£1 and upwards, yearly subscription—Contributor.

Provided always that no minister, congregation, association, society, company, or person shall nominate as a contributor or contributors any person or persons, the yearly subscription or subscriptions for whom shall be sought or intended to be paid out of moneys derived from a public or private collection for Charitable purposes. Every firm or partnership subscribing may exercise their privileges through one of themselves to be nominated in writing by such firm, and the Trustees or Executors of every Estate subscribing may exercise their privileges through one of themselves to be nominated in writing by such Trustees or Executors, and every Public or Corporate Body subscribing may exercise their privileges through some person in their employ to be nominated in writing by such Public or Corporate Body. The power of voting by nominees at Annual or Special Meeting being limited to three votes for all they represent.

Bye-Law No. 6.

Life Governors will be entitled to recommend—

1 In and 4 Out-Patients (always on the books.)

Life Subscriber—

1 In and 2 Out-Patients annually.

Governor for 1 year—

10 In and 20 Out-Patients.

Contributor—

1 In and 2 Out-Patients annually for each £1 subscribed.

Honorary Collector—

1 In and 2 Out-Patients annually for each £1 collected.

Bye-Law No. 7.

Recommendation shall be made by ticket, and shall be only used for the recommendation of persons unable to pay for medical attendance; the reception of such persons shall be subject to the approval of the Committee of Management, and provided that the funds and the accommodation of the Institution admit of their reception. When recommendations cannot be acceded to, a ticket in lieu of that used shall be returned to the Subscriber. Tickets will be issued by the Secretary to Subscribers at the time of payment of subscriptions. Subscribers shall also have the privilege at any time, on application to the Secretary, of exchanging Out-Patients for In-Patients; and *vice versa*, one In-Patient's ticket being equivalent to three Out-Patients'.

Bye-Law No. 8.

Subscribers of £1 and upwards shall have full power to vote at all meetings from time of payment, and shall be deemed Annual Subscribers from date of payment.

Bye-Law No. 9.

At all Annual and Special Meetings of the Corporation, Life Governors shall have three votes; Life Subscribers and Annual Governors two votes; Annual Contributors of £5 5s. and upwards three votes; £3 3s. two votes; £1 one vote; Honorary Collectors for whole amount collected in one year one vote.

GENERAL MEETINGS.**Bye-Law No. 12.**

An Annual Meeting of the Contributors shall be held on the last Thursday in the month of July in every year for the following purposes:—

(1) To receive the Report of the Committee of Management and audited statement of receipts and expenditure for the year to 30th June preceding.

(2) For the election of President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer, Honorary Medical Staff, and Auditors for the ensuing year.

(3) The election of Members of the Committee of Management to fill vacancies.

(4) For the transaction of any business of which notice has been given, or that may arise at such meeting connected with the Institution.

Bye-Law No. 13.

If required by the Committee of Management, or upon the requisition in writing of six members of the Committee, or of ten Contributors, the Secretary shall without delay convene a special meeting of Contributors, the occasion of calling such meeting being stated in such requisition; and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting except that for which it shall have been summoned.

Bye-Law No. 14.

All meetings of Contributors shall be called by the Secretary by advertisement in one or more newspapers published in Geelong, for at least one week previous to such meeting.

Bye-Law No. 15.

At all meetings of Contributors, the President, or in his absence one of the Vice-Presidents, shall take the chair; but in their absence the meeting shall choose its own chairman, who shall have a casting vote only.

Bye-Law No. 16.

Ten Contributors entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum at all meetings of Contributors, and as soon as a quorum be present the chair shall be taken; but if no quorum is present within half-an-hour of the time named, such meeting shall stand adjourned for the following week at the same day and hour.

Bye-Law No. 17.

Every question submitted to a General Meeting, and all elections, shall be decided by a majority of votes of Governors and Contributors present entitled to vote, and shall be taken by a show of hands, unless a ballot shall have been previously demanded by any three persons entitled to vote, in which case the voting shall be by ballot, and for such purpose scrutineers shall be appointed before the ballot is taken; and such elections by ballot shall be held on such day and such place as the Committee shall have determined, and shall have notified by advertisement in one or more newspapers published in Geelong three clear days before the said general meeting; and at such ballot all Governors and Contributors, who are entitled to and desire to vote, shall attend in their proper persons; and the poll shall be kept open from three o'clock p.m. to eight o'clock p.m., and the Committee shall make provision for the orderly conduct of such election, and for the proper counting of the votes, and the publications of the result.

ADMISSION OF PATIENTS INTO THE INFIRMARY.**Bye-Law No. 58.**

Accidents and such cases of decided emergency only as in the opinion of the Resident Surgeon cannot be delayed may be received in the Infirmary at any time without ticket; and the admission of patients, in ordinary cases recommended by Subscribers' tickets, shall be daily (Sundays excepted), between the hours of nine and twelve o'clock in the forenoon, by the Secretary and the Honorary Medical Staff for the week, or in the absence of such Staff, by the Secretary and Resident Surgeon; such admission to be temporary, and subject to the approval of the House Committee at its next meeting.

ADMISSION OF PAYING PATIENTS.**Bye-Law No. 59.**

Paying patients may be admitted at the discretion of the House Committee, who shall fix the weekly rate to be charged to each patient, and in the event of an operation being necessary may fix a fee therefor, and may require the same to be paid in advance; and every person admitted on the ground of emergency to the benefits of the Institution, and able, in the estimation of the Committee, to pay, shall be required to do so at such rate as the Committee may determine. Each admission of a paying patient shall be reported to the General Committee at its next meeting, and shall be subject to confirmation.

Bye-Law No. 60.

The General Rules and Regulations of the Institution shall be applicable to, and be observed by all paying patients.

PERSONS NOT ADMISSIBLE.**Bye-Law No. 61.**

No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement; no insane person, except on remand for medical examination in the Lunatic Ward; no one having a contagious or infectious

disease; none subject to epilepsy; nor any one, who, in the opinion of the Honorary Medical Staff for the week, or the Resident Surgeon, might receive equal benefit as an out patient, shall be admitted; and no child under five years of age shall be admitted, except in cases of accidents or for a surgical operation; nor except under special circumstances shall patients be admitted from other districts where Hospitals exist; provided that the House Committee or Officers of the Institution shall have discretionary power to admit such prohibited cases, and shall report upon the exercise of such power to the next general meeting of the Committee of Management.

ADMISSION OF INMATES INTO THE BENEVOLENT ASYLUM.

Bye-Law No. 62.

The admission of Inmates into the Benevolent Asylum shall be restricted to those days in each week upon which the House Committee meets, when applications shall be considered and decided upon. No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement; no person insane; no child under twelve years of age; no one having a contagious or infectious disease, shall be admitted.

RULES FOR VISITORS.

1.—Visitors shall be admitted into the Institution on Sunday and Thursday in each week, between the hours of two and four in the afternoon, but no visitor shall be allowed to remain more than one hour. Not more than two visitors will be allowed to see any patient at the same time, except on special occasions, and by leave of the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent.

2.—Visitors may be admitted on special occasions by the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent, or by a written order from a member of the House Committee.

3.—Visitors shall not be allowed to enter any ward without the leave of the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent, and every visitor shall retire when requested.

4.—They shall not be permitted to give to or leave with any patient any medicines, food or liquor of any kind, without the express leave of the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent.

5.—No visitor shall give to any servant of the Institution any money or gratuity of any kind.

6.—Visitors shall not interfere with the Wardsmen or Nurses, or disturb the patients by loud talking or unnecessary noise.

7.—No male visitor shall visit a female ward without the leave of the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent, and then shall not enter the ward without the Nurse in charge being first informed.

8.—Any visitor violating any of the Regulations of the Institution, or behaving with impropriety, shall be compelled to retire, and will not be re-admitted without special leave from the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent.

MINISTERS OF RELIGION, &c.

Any Minister of Religion or Religious Instructor shall have free access to the patients of their respective denominations at all reasonable times, when not objected to by such patients or the Medical Staff.

Ministers and others performing religious services at the bedside of any patient, shall do so in such a manner as to be as little overheard as possible by the surrounding patients.
