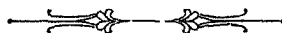

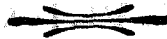

The FORTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT of the General Committee of Management.

THE Board of Management of the Geelong Infirmary and Benevolent Asylum have the honour to submit for the information of the Governors, the Subscribers, and the General Public, their Forty-seventh Annual Report of the conditions and progress of the Institution, for the year ending 30th June, 1899, together with an Audited Balance Sheet and a synopsis of the finances.

The latter part of the year has been marked by the excessive number of Typhoid cases admitted, which has been a great strain on the resources of the Hospital, both as regards the nursing staff, and from a financial aspect, 99 patients have been treated for this disease, 9 died, and there are remaining at present under treatment, 13. Your committee is glad to be able to say that notwithstanding the numbers admitted, no case has had to be refused this year, through want of room.

Your Committee, while thanking the many generous subscribers for the way in which they support the Institution, feel it their duty to say that the contributions do not compare favourably with other charities of a like nature (see page 12 re Municipal Grants) and earnestly appeal for help to those who do not subscribe

There are hundreds of non-subscribers in the Town and District, who would never miss a small sum once a year, and to these this request is specially directed.

An effort has been made to induce some of the ladies residing in the town to collect small sums from people whom it is found hard to approach in the usual way.

This system, which works very satisfactorily in other centres, has not been marked with

any degree of success here, as with a few exceptions the cards have been returned empty.

This has been disappointing, as it was hoped that a considerable source of income would accrue. Ladies willing to collect are respectfully solicited to send in their names to the Secretary. For every £1 collected, one In, and two Out-patients tickets will be issued.

Subscribers are earnestly requested to bring the pressing needs of the Institution forcibly before their friends and the public. It cannot fail to strike one that the same names appear year after year on all the charitable subscription lists. These generous few are mulcted for every thing, while the large majority go on their way, not contributing one penny. It is to this majority that your committee looks for aid, especially as in their ranks will be found the ones who derive the benefits of the Institution.

The daily average in the House has been 186.0.

The average rate of mortality has been 9.3 for all cases, and 8.3 for Hospital In-Door Patients. 7 Deaths occurred within 24 hours of admission. This is a low death rate for a General Hospital.

The total number remaining in the House on the 30th June, 1899, was 184.

Income and Expenditure.

The Receipts for Maintenance during the year, were £6431 6s. 11d.; and the total Expenditure under this heading was £5609 4s. 7d.

Under the classification of Building £92 1s. 5d. was paid.

The Bank Overdraft on 30th June, 1898, was £1650 12s. 5d. This was reduced in July, to £256 5s. 4d., by transferring £1394 7s. 1d. from the Endowment Fund to the General Account.

A balance of £252 10s lying to the credit of the Endowment Fund, was subsequently transferred to the General Account, and the Endowment Fund is now practically extinct.

With the coming year a good deal of painting, general renovating and repairs will have to be done, and it is hoped that an increased income will enable your Committee to successfully undertake this.

Annual average cost, £28 1s. 7d. per head. This is £4 13s. per head less than last year, and £7 2s. 7d. than the year before that.

Considering the excessively high price of provisions, this should be considered a very satisfactory reduction, and is the one and only basis on which calculations can be properly made. It would have been considerably lower but for the enhanced prices ruling for meat, butter, milk, and potatoes, etc., in the early part of 1898.

The milk account has risen from £270 9s. 11d. in 1897-98 (when there was a daily average of 192.8 inmates) to £329 18s. 3d. for the year under review with a daily average of only 186; and meat which in the former year cost £554 18s. 10d. has risen to £631 3s. 8d.

These items have all been adverse to a low cost per head, yet notwithstanding these factors, your Committee, by scrupulous care and attention to minor details, is proud to be able to show so large a reduction.

Charge for Drugs to Out-Patients.

Every care is taken to prevent this being in the slightest degree oppressive, and all those who are too poor to pay are exempted. The Secretary inquires into each case. An increase of £28 10s. shows for the current year, although the numbers treated are less than during 1897-98.

Inspector of Charities Report.

Mr. F. T. Short, Inspector of Charities visited the Institution on 25th October. The following are extracts from his Report to the Hon. the Treasurer of Victoria:—

“The Wards, &c. were clean and in good order. The institution is particularly well managed.”

“The fire appliances appeared to be satisfactory. The male staff, are trained in the use of the fire hose, and during my visit they were put to the test, and the system seemed to work well.”

“The Operating Theatre is a new building, and is built on the most approved principles. The possession of such a fine operating theatre is a credit to the institution.

Improvements.

The open Channel in front of the Hospital, of which so many complaints have been made on previous occasions, has been improved by an underground drain connected with the main sewer.

Mr. McKenzie, the Engineer to the Geelong Town Council, very kindly undertook to supervise the work, and it is hardly necessary to add that this was done in a masterly manner.

The Geelong Town Council gave a contribution of £10 towards the cost of this, for which your Committee begs to thank them.

A plant for the manufacture of Soda Water, Lemonade, or any other Aerated Drink required, together with the necessary bottles has been purchased, and has worked since January with gratifying success, saving the Institution a very considerable sum; various minor details too numerous to mention have also been introduced.

Staff.

Dr. G. McCallum, Resident Surgeon, resigned in September, and Drs. Knight and McPhee were appointed respectively, as senior and junior Resident Surgeons. They have justified their selection.

The Trainees continue to perform their duties with care and attention

The whole staff works well, each member loyally supporting the Officers, and taking an interest in his or her special department.

The Committee is pleased to note that the Work of the Hospital has gone on evenly and pleasantly during the year, and they gladly recognise the tact and ability of the Superintendent.

Benevolent Asylum.

The beds are always full, and a certain number of applications though urgent, have to be refused admission pending a vacancy.

Increased accomodation will have to be faced at no distant date.

Entertainments in Aid.

There is no doubt that much more might be done in the way of providing amusements for the public, and at the same time having a substantial profit to hand over to local charities.

Gifts in Kind.

Your Committee is much obliged to all friends of the Institution who have contributed under this heading, and would be thankful to see the numbers increase.

Only a few, a very few, of the farmers and orchardists of the district send vegetables or fruit, both being in much demand with our inmates.

Such articles as firewood, fruit, vegetables, worn clothing, old linen, &c., will always be gratefully received.

Re Municipal Grants.

The Hon. the Treasurer of Victoria has drawn special attention to the small amount contributed by the Shires and Municipal Bodies of the town and district as compared with other parts of the colony and writes, "It cannot be conceived that the Municipal Bodies of your district would refuse to recognize their responsibility and substantially increase their grants if they were appealed to."

All have been appealed to more than once, and several have increased their donations. The Geelong Town Council wrote "that they were unable to grant the request at present." Some of the Councillors expressed a hope that the Council would deal more liberally with the Hospital when the estimates for the next year were being prepared. The Mayor in reply "said that the Council recognized that the Hospital was an institution deserving of more liberal support, but the funds were not available to comply with the claims for increased assistance just now."

Appended herewith is a comparative statement of the municipal grants and private subscriptions, together with the daily average of inmates of several other Institutions in Victoria, for the year ended June 30th, 1898.

A careful perusal of these figures will show that the Municipal Grant, viz.—£84 towards this institution by the local bodies is ridiculously small, when compared with Ballarat, £349, Bendigo, £335, Horsham, £244, Hamilton, £485, etc. Nor do the private contributions come up to those of the places named. Ballarat Municipalities also contribute nearly £500 annually to their Benevolent Asylum, which is a separate Institution, and Bendigo £280.

As stated elsewhere 99 cases of Typhoid and 26 of Diphtheria have been treated at your Hospital during the past year, at great expense.

It should be remembered that the Hospital admits these infectious diseases against its own Rules, and takes a heavy burden, which rightly belongs to the aforesaid bodies, and it is now hoped that they will recognise their responsibility, and substantially increase their grants to bring themselves in line with other districts, and so prevent further comments by the Hon. the Treasurer, as already quoted. Failing this, your Committee sees no other alternative but to charge each district with its own infectious cases. This is already being done at Creswick, and several other places.

The Hospital Sunday

The collections last year showed a falling off £19 6s. 7d, which is to be deplored.

The amount received year by year is steadily decreasing. In 1889 it was £484 16s., for the year under review, £228 8s. 7d. It is hoped that in the coming October, the amount will show an increase.

The present system of making a special collection and calling it Hospital Sunday, subsequently allocating a certain percentage to the Ladies' Benevolent Society, and the Homœopathic Dispensary is not entirely satisfactory.

Some churches do not adhere to the rate of distribution decided upon by the Hospital Sunday Committee, making their own allocations, and in some instances, giving as much as half their collections to the Ladies' Society. It would be far better to have one collection entirely for the Hospital, and another for the other Societies, donors would then know exactly to what they were giving. Then again, some Churches take out from the Hospital Sunday Collections an amount equivalent to their average collections, the Sunday Fund receiving the surplus. In these cases it would be better if the Clergy and Ministers would consent to have small envelopes placed in each pew and the special donation placed therein.

Report of Monthly Visitors for the Year.

JULY 13th, 1898.

Mr. W. Higgins reported having visited the Institution, in conjunction with Rev. A. Webb; they found everything clean, orderly, and in its usual satisfactory state.

AUGUST 10th, 1898.

Mr. G. S. Faulkner reported having visited the Institution, and finding everything clean, neat, and in good order. The Rev. E. O'Brien wrote endorsing Mr. Faulkner's report.

SEPTEMBER 13th, 1898

The Rev. A. Davidson had found everything in a very satisfactory state. He recommended, however, that the House Committee should take steps to have the broken flags repaired, and the ground levelled outside the kitchen door. The President endorsed the Revd. Gentleman's report, and said he had enquired carefully for complaints but received none.

OCTOBER 12th, 1898,

Dr. J. Small and the Hon. J. H. Connor were well pleased with everything in the Institution and gave a satisfactory report.

NOVEMBER 10th, 1898.

Mr. J. Purdie, on behalf of himself and the Rev. E. T. Cox, reported they had found everything in good order, and were well pleased with their inspection. Mr. Purdie remarked that some of the dead trees might be removed.

DECEMBER 14th, 1898.

A report was submitted by Mr. G. Martin and Rev. Canon Goodman, to the effect that they had carefully examined the whole premises. The wards were found clean, in good order, and with every appearance of efficient management. They regretted that the drain in front of the Hospital had not yet been commenced, they also suggested that garden seats, with sloping backs, should be bought for the use of Patients on the balconies.

JANUARY 11th, 1899.

Messrs. J. Vines and H. B. Brown gave a satisfactory report, they found everything in good order, and were well satisfied with their inspection.

FEBRUARY 8th, 1899.

Mr. W. W. Bradley reported that the cleanliness of the Institution was as usual, perfect. Mr. Shannon, the other visitor, said he agreed with the report. They had, however, to complain of the quality of the bread; the Secretary informed the meeting the cause of this, and that it was an isolated case.

MARCH 8th, 1899.

The Hon. J. H. Connor in his report said he was thoroughly satisfied with his inspection, and found no complaints.

APRIL 12th, 1899.

In company with Mr. G. S. Faulkner, the Rev. A. Webb visited the Institution for the month, and found everything in perfect order, grounds well kept, wards clean and neat, and had no recommendations to make.

MAY 10th, 1899.

The Rev. Father O'Brien reported that he had found everything in excellent order, during his visit to the Institution in May.

JUNE 14th, 1899.

In the Rev. A. Davidson's report, he said he found everything in a satisfactory condition, and heard no complaints. Dr. Small endorsed the Rev. Gentleman's statements.

Infectious Ward.

To mark the Diamond Jubilee of Her Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria, a movement was inaugurated for the erection of an Infectious Ward in connection with your Hospital.

A sum of about £1432 is available and it is proposed to erect a Ward containing 16 beds in the Hospital Grounds.

Dr. J. Small has gone to a lot of trouble and given his valuable time in obtaining plans on the most modern principles, and much other valuable information. At a meeting of the Committee held recently at the Town Hall, he laid the said plans before His Worship the Mayor, which could be erected in brick for £1680. A similar building he informed the meeting could be built at a little less cost if constructed of wood, but he strongly recommended bricks.

Should the subscribers and Committee agree to this proposal, it will be necessary to raise the extra funds at an early date, so as to be ready for the Typhoid and Diphtheria next year. A sum of £200 will also be necessary to furnish the building throughout.

It is thought that no great difficulty will be found in collecting the £450 required when the public sees that the movement is really within a fair distance of accomplishment, considering the pressing and urgent need of such accommodation and the important town and district to which we minister.

Honorary Medical Staff.

The Honorary Medical Staff consists of Drs. Newman, Marwood, Kennedy and McCallum, with Drs. Croker and Small as Honorary Consulting Surgeons. The first four now retire but are eligible for re-election.

Dr. J. Small was appointed Honorary Consulting Surgeon in April last, and Dr. McCallum was elected to fill his place.

On behalf of the Subscribers the thanks of the Committee are tendered to these gentlemen for their kind attention to the Patients during the year.

Christmas Festivities.

The thanks of your Committee are gratefully tendered to all who by their generosity and practical sympathy, helped to make the Xmas Season a happy one at the Hospital for the patients and inmates.

The Factory and Workshop Employees Subscriptions.

In last year's Report, managers and proprietors of Shops and Factories were asked to bring before their employees the system of small voluntary allowances each pay day, every employee receiving a certain wage, to give say, one penny per week. During the current year, employers of labour in the town and district were written to, asking their kind interest in this system, and requesting their permission for a collecting box to be sent to them. It is with regret that we have to report that from upwards of a hundred to whom this request was made, only two firms considered it necessary to reply.

Collections in State Schools.

Collecting Lists were sent to every School in the District, and although the amounts contributed have not been large, it is gratifying to see that the children and teachers take sufficient interest to collect what they have.

Children cannot be taught too early, that it is their duty to help the sick and helpless to the best of their ability; as they are then more likely to remember their responsibility on attaining adult life.

Many of their little companions pass through the wards annually.

Re Providing a Bed.

To those who may be disposed to signalise any particular year by giving a special donation, your Committee would commend the maintenance of a bed. The estimated cost of each bed on an average of years is about £75; if therefore, anyone alone or in conjunction with others contributes that sum, he will have the satisfaction of knowing that thereby a bed is maintained for a year; in other words, that he has provided for about ten patients, allowing each an average period of residence, viz.—34.15 days.

The system of endowing a bed in perpetuity, in memory of deceased relatives, (the names of the donors being inscribed on a tablet at the Hospital) is respectfully suggested to your notice as being a noble and charitable way of perpetuating their memory.

These vacancies with five others making the statutory six will have to be filled at the forthcoming Annual Meeting.

EXTRACTS FROM BYE-LAWS

OBJECTS.

Bye-Law No. 2:

That the objects of the Infirmary be to afford medical and surgical aid to poor persons requiring it; to a limited number of paying patients whose admission, under special circumstances, may be sanctioned by the Committee of Management; and for casualties; but no person who shall meet with casualties and shall be found able to pay for surgical aid shall receive further than temporary assistance. That the objects of the Benevolent Asylum be the reception of the poor and distressed, with a view to afford them consolation and assistance.

APPROPRIATION OF BUILDINGS.

Bye-Law No. 3.

That a portion of one of the buildings shall be set apart for the purpose of an Infirmary, and a portion for the purpose of the Benevolent Asylum, at the discretion of the Committee, who shall also be empowered to permit the reception of Lunatics on remand for medical examination in a ward erected for that purpose.

CONSTITUTION.

Bye-Law No. 4.

The Corporation shall consist of a President, two Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Governors, and Contributors.

QUALIFICATION, DESIGNATION AND PRIVILEGES OF BENEFACTORS.

Bye-Law No. 5.

The following shall be the qualification, designation, and privileges of Governors, Contributors, and Honorary Collectors, viz. :—

£50, personal contribution in one year—Life Governor.

£20 " " " Life Subscriber.

£50 Bequest under will, first named or acting executor (bequest under will) under such will. } Governor for one year.

£20 Society, Association, or Company collecting or paying in one year (to nominate for each £20 collected or paid). } Life Subscriber.

£1 and upwards, Minister of Church or Layman collecting in one year. } Honorary Collector.

£1 and upwards, yearly subscription—Contributor.

Provided always that no minister, congregation, association, society, company, or person shall nominate as a contributor or contributors any person or persons, the yearly subscription or subscriptions for whom shall be sought or intended to be paid out of moneys derived

from a public or private collection for Charitable purposes. Every firm or partnership subscribing may exercise their privileges through one of themselves to be nominated in writing by such firm, and the Trustees or Executors of every Estate subscribing may exercise their privileges through one of themselves to be nominated in writing by such Trustees or Executors, and every Public or Corporate Body subscribing may exercise their privileges through some person in their employ to be nominated in writing by such Public or Corporate Body. The power of voting by nominees at Annual or Special Meeting being limited to three votes for all they represent.

Bye-Law No. 6.

Life Governors will be entitled to recommend—

1 In and 4 Out-Patients (always on the books)

Life Subscriber—

1 In and 2 Out-Patients annually,

Governor for one year—

10 In and 20 Out-Patients.

Contributor—

1 In and 2 Out-Patients annually for each £1 subscribed.

Honorary Collector—

1 In and 2 Out-Patients annually for each £1 collected.

Bye-Law No. 7.

Recommendation shall be made by ticket and shall be only used for the recommendation of persons **unable** to pay for medical attendance; the reception of such persons shall be subject to the approval of the Committee of Management, and provided that the funds and the accommodation of the Institution admit of their reception. When recommendations cannot be acceded to, a ticket in lieu of that used shall be returned to the Subscriber. Tickets will be issued by the Secretary to Subscribers at the time of payment of subscriptions. Subscribers shall also have the privilege at any time, on application to the Secretary, of exchanging Out-Patients for In-Patients; and vice versa, one In-Patient's ticket being equivalent to three Out-Patients'.

Bye-Law No. 8.

Subscribers of £1 and upwards shall have full power to vote at all meetings from time of payment, and shall be deemed Annual Subscribers from date of payment.

Bye-Law No. 9.

At all Annual and Special Meetings of the Corporation, Life Governors shall have three votes; Life Subscribers and Annual Governors, two votes; Annual Contributors of £5 5s. and upwards, three votes, £3 3s., two votes; £1, one vote. Honorary Collectors for whole amount collected in one year, one vote.

GENERAL MEETINGS.

Bye-Law No. 12.

An Annual Meeting of the Contributors shall be held on the last Thursday in the month of July in every year for the following purposes:—

(1.) To receive the Report of the Committee of Management and audited Statement of Receipts and Expenditure for the year to 30th June preceding.

(2.) For the election of President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer, Honorary Medical Staff, and Auditors for the ensuing year.

(3.) The election of Members of the Committee of Management to fill vacancies.

(4.) For the transaction of any business of which notice has been given or that may arise at such meeting connected with the Institution.

Bye-Law No. 13.

If required by the Committee of Management or upon the requisition in writing of six members of the Committee or of ten Contributors, the Secretary shall, without delay, convene a special meeting of the Contributors, the occasion of calling such meeting being stated in such requisition; and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting except that for which it shall have been summoned.

Bye-Law No. 14.

All meetings of Contributors shall be called by the Secretary by advertisement in one or more newspapers published in Geelong, for at least one week previous to such meeting.

Bye-Law No. 15.

At all meetings of Contributors, the President, or in his absence, one of the Vice-Presidents shall take the chair; but in their absence the meeting shall choose its own chairman, who shall have a casting vote only.

Bye-Law No. 16.

Ten Contributors entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum at all meetings of Contributors, and as soon as a quorum be present the chair shall be taken; but if no quorum is present within half-an-hour of the time named such meeting shall stand adjourned for the following week at the same day and hour.

Bye-Law No. 17.

Every question submitted to a General Meeting, and all elections shall be decided by a majority of votes of Governors and Contributors present entitled to vote, and shall be taken by a show of hands, unless a ballot shall have been previously demanded by any three persons entitled to vote, in which case the voting shall be by ballot, and for such purpose scrutineers shall be appointed before the ballot is taken; and such elections by ballot shall be held on such day and such place as the Committee shall have determined, and shall have notified by advertisement in one or more newspapers published in Geelong three clear days before the said general meeting; and at such ballot all Governors and Contributors who are entitled to and desire to vote, shall attend in their proper persons; and the poll shall be kept open from three o'clock p.m. to eight o'clock p.m., and the Committee shall make provision for the orderly conduct of such election, and for the proper counting of the votes, and the publication of the result.

ADMISSION OF PATIENTS INTO THE INFIRMARY.**Bye-Law No. 58.**

Accidents and such cases of decided emergency only as in the opinion of the Resident Surgeon cannot be delayed may be received in the Infirmary at any time without ticket; and the admission of patients, in ordinary cases recommended by Subscribers' tickets, shall be daily (Sundays excepted) between the hours of nine and twelve o'clock in the forenoon, by the Secretary and the Honorary Medical Staff for the week, or in the absence of such staff, by the Secretary and Resident Surgeon; such admission to be temporary, and subject to the approval of the House Committee at its next meeting.

ADMISSION OF PAYING PATIENTS.**Bye-Law No. 59.**

Paying patients may be admitted at the discretion of the House Committee, who shall fix the weekly rate to be charged to each patient, and in the event of an operation being necessary may fix a fee therefore, and may require the same to be paid in advance; and every person admitted on the ground of emergency to the benefits of the Institution, and able, in the estimation of the Committee, to pay, shall be required to do so at such rate as the Committee may determine. Each admission of a paying patient shall be reported to the General Committee at its next meeting, and shall be subject to confirmation.

Bye-Law No. 60.

The General Rules and Regulations of the Institution shall be applicable to, and be observed by all paying patients.

PERSONS NOT ADMISSIBLE.

Bye-Law No. 61.

No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement; no insane person, except on remand for medical examination in the Lunacy Ward; no one having a contagious or infectious disease; no one subject to epilepsy; nor any one who, in the opinion of the Honorary Medical Staff for the week, or the Resident Surgeon, might receive equal benefit as an out-patient, shall be admitted; and no child under five years of age shall be admitted, except in cases of accidents or for a surgical operation; nor except under special circumstances shall patients be admitted from other districts where Hospitals exist; provided that the House Committee or Officers of the Institution shall discretionary power to admit such prohibited cases, and shall report upon the exercise of such power to the next general meeting of the Committee of Management.

ADMISSION OF INMATES INTO THE BENEVOLENT ASYLUM.

Bye-Law No. 62.

The admission of inmates into the Benevolent Asylum shall be restricted to those days in each week upon which the House Committee meets, when applications shall be considered and decided upon. No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement; no person insane; no child under twelve years of age; no one having a contagious or infectious disease, shall be admitted.

PAYMENT OF MAINTENANCE.

All patients will be expected to pay towards the actual expenses of their maintenance, so far as their circumstances may enable them; and all property found on patients who may die in the Hospital will be appropriated to defray the expenses of the maintenance and burial. The residue, if any, to be handed over to their legal representatives.

The Committee of Management shall appoint a sub-committee (with the concurrence of the Surgeon) which shall have power to discharge any patient in case of his refusal to pay; and shall have the further power to require (if necessary) patients to make a declaration before a Justice as to their means.
